UNICEF Reports More Than \$8,000

Harrisburg — A state-wide youth campaign to make Halloween more of a treat than trick reduced vandalism and netted \$8,447 for the UNICEF (United Nations Children's Fund) it was reported here today by Chauncey J. Varner, Director of Youth Work of the Pennsylvania State Council of Christian Education.

Reports made to the Council show that more than two thousand youth from 242 local churches participated in the drive.

The Halloween campaign enlisted the support of young people in collecting coins rather than candy. The money is used in a health-building program for over 90 under-developed countries, said Mr. Varner. He stated that one dollar provides enough powdered milk to give nine children a glass of milk every day for a week or protects twenty-four children against tuberculosis. He said that the Children's Fund helps under-developed countries help themselves in establishing health and nutrition facilities.

The figures on the number of young people and churches participating do not tell the whole story, he said. Many communities failed to report to the state office. He estimated that contributions to the fund would exceed \$10,000.

The planned result has to turn the energies of youth into doing something constructive rather than destructive. Testimony from juvenile authorities in communities where a successful campaign was launched indicates that vandalism was greatly reduced, said Mr. Varner. Every year more communities are joining in the effort not only because of what it does for the Children's Fund but because of what it does for the local communities, he said.

A youth leader reporting on the project to the state office said—"it is an excellent idea. It helps prevent vandalism and gives the young people the wonderful feeling of helping others."

The secretary of another youth group reported that the "church bells were rung to tell the townspeople that the young people were on their way so that the whole community took part. All this helped to turn "Halloween" into "Halloween."

The twenty-eight areas reporting were: Bradford, Gallitzin, Rockhill Furnace, Robisonia, Huntingdon, State College, Shamokin, Orangeville, Hickory Twp. (Mercer County), Huntingdon County Christian Youth Council (District No. 6).
