found in any section of the country inasmuch as he is constantly fleeing from the law. Police pursuit and wide-spread publicity keep him continually on the move so that he can be expected to appear in the smallest hamlet as well as the larger cities in the country.

People often ask the question "What does a criminal look like?" but experience shows there is no such thing as a criminal type. Statistics taken of those who have been on the Top Ten list show that they have average 5' 9" in height, weigh 160 pounds, and have brown hair and eyes. The shortest fugitive was 5' 3" and the tallest almost 6' 3". The average age is 40 and they have exhibited a definite propensity for numerous types of body tattoos.

Another interesting feature is that the Top Ten fugitives apprehended to date have been arrested approximately 931 mi from the point where the crime for which they were charged was committed.

Next week The Bulletin will start the series of fugitive reports with the story of David Daniel Keegan, one of the FBI's "Ten Most Wanted Fugitives," who is wanted for Unlawful Flight to Avoid Prosecution for the Crime of Murder.

**Guest Director Named For District Band**

Dr. Paul E. Wiggin will be the guest conductor at the district band concert which will be held in Middletown January 12, 13 and 14. Ronald Hawthorne has been chosen as the representative from Donegal High School in the band.

Dr. Wiggin is director of instrumental music in the Warwick High School, Warwick, R. I., and camp director and owner of the New England Music Camp in Oakland, Maine.

Dr. Wiggin received his Bachelor's Degree from Boston University. He continued his education by pursuing graduate work at the University of Montreal where he received his Doctor's Degree in Music. Since his graduation, Dr. Wiggin has had thirty-five years of teaching experience in the public schools.

For one year, he served Conductor of the All-Eastern School Band Concert which performed for the Eastern District of the National Education Conference in 1939. Dr. Wiggin organized the All-New England Festival and was its Director for seven years. Later, in the same organization, he served as Secretary of the Association and as its Conductor for many years. He has conducted All-State Bands in each of the New England States as well as directing All State Vermont Concert Festival Band for the past twenty years.

He has conducted the International High School Band for the past three years - composed of players from New York, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Maine, and several provinces from Canada. In 1955 Dr. Wiggin was guest conductor of the South Jersey High School Band Festival, Region III, Riverside, New Jersey.

Thursday, January 12, the high school musicians will stage rehearsals. Both Friday and Saturday evenings, the group will present public performances.

**1501 ADMITTED TO LANCASTER GENERAL HOSPITAL IN NOVEMBER**

Lancaster General Hospital admitted 1501 persons during the month of November, it was announced today by Dr. Donald C. Smelzer, Executive Director of the hospital, at a meeting of the Board of Directors on Monday, Dec. 12, 1955.

The admitted persons required 11,393 days of hospital service.

Other census figures include: Patients discharged during the month 1509, Number of operations 717, Number of births 278, 1014 patients were treated in the Receiving Ward, 410 patients were treated in the dispensary with 593 visits. The average number of patients per day was 380. The highest number of patients for one day during the month was 402 on Thursday, Nov. 3.
