The Pennsylvania Story

HARRISBURG — Unquestionably the squirrels who inhabit the wooded domain atop Capitol Hill here in Harrisburg—like their counterparts in legislative circles—are grazing from their treetop homes somewhat balefully at the numbing cold that surrounds them.

About the only difference perhaps is the fact that the furrowed brethren must contend with the frigidness of the weather itself while the lawmakers almost inevitably face a cold front blowing in from voters at home.

The past legislative mumbo-jumbo—known more formally as the 1955 session of the Legislature—has undoubtedly generated a baffled and irking reaction on the part of the electorate at home, if worried frets and frowns of the gents who comprise Pennsylvania's General Assembly can be accepted as any indication.

The twelve months duration of the 1955 political slug fest, it is generally conceded, has not been conducive to the populace strewing paths with roses as lawmakers return home from the wars in this quaint but brave village along the banks of the Susquehanna.

The record of accomplishment of the 1955 session—which researchers are frantically and diligently still trying to uncover somewhere somehow—is still one of those items much talked about but which no one has seen.

Not too long ago we mentioned in this column the despairing and frightful fact that chance was excellent that when lawmakers sought re-election this year one of the most brutal obstacles they would have to overcome would be their very ar-long fiddle-faddie session which unquestionably will hurt many a lawmaker seeking return tickets this year.
 Perhaps underscoring this point and it might be said, typical of comments this column has received from good, fine, loyal, upstanding and intelligent readers of this column throughout the state, is a letter from Mr. Charles A. Markel, Sr., of Lock Haven.

We quote from only one sentence of our good reader's letter:

"They (the legislators) need fear not so much the protracted session of the Legislature as what they did, such as increasing their salaries, expense funds, various emoluments and any other source of personal benefits their imaginations could whip into form."
 The importance of this communication from our Clinton County reader seemingly lies in the fact that re—like others, according to their letters—in his thinking regarding the 1955 session has gone beyond the simple outstanding fact that it was a long one.

To this columnist it illustrates once again our contention that today the rank and file voter on both the state and local level is taking far greater interest and concern in government than ever before. He has no other choice if he hopes to survive economically.

Without doubt the 1955 session has done much to kill off some of the current members in their chances for return this year. Together with the squirrels they have a bleak and cold outlook.
