LANCASTER FIRM DEVELOPS NEW ROAD COMPOUND

A new compound developed by the Manu-Mine Research & Development Co. of Reading, Pa., may go a long way toward helping to preserve and strengthen the Nation's highways and streets.

The compound is Manu-Tite, and Manu-Mine plans to start production of it soon in a new building erected as part of the company's wholly owned subsidiary, American Testing Laboratories Inc., Lancaster.

C. A. Landside, general manager of Manu-Mine, said the company's new product will be used primarily to seal the joints of highways and airport runways, particularly the joints of runways used by jet aircraft.

John O. Fulmer Jr., technical director of American Testing Laboratories, who will direct the manufacture and production of Manu-Tite, said the new product will be turned out according to specifications of the Corps of Army Engineers.

Fulmer described Manu-Tite as a cold-applied substance, designed to withstand the heat of exhausts of big trucks on highways and of jet aircraft on airport runways. Manu-Tite will not be dissolved by gasoline, oil or jet fuels, he said.

His parents reported that the accident occurred January 1st. Airman Yordy suffered injuries of both legs which left both members paralyzed.

First In F.B.I.-Bulletin Series On Most Wanted Criminals

WANTED BY THE FBI



David Daniel Keegan

On the night of February 22, 1954, the farm house of William Edwards, located four miles southeast of Mondamin, Iowa, presented a quiet and tranquil appearance. Edwards, a 51-year-old bachelor, was napping on a couch in the livingroom while his sister and visiting woman cousin were in the kitchen washing the evening meal dishes.

Suddenly, three masked intruders burst into the kitchen. One of the trio kept the two women under guard while the other two entered the dining-room. The leader of the group ordered the farmer to open up an old-fashioned safe which stood in one corner of the livingroom. Edwards refused and attempted to resist the ring-leader, who promptly shot him down. The telephone was torn from the wall and the wounded man's sister and cousin were bound with strips torn from a bedspread. The unopened safe was carried to a waiting automobile and the three bandits drove away, leaving Edwards dying on the farm house floor.

Local authorities immediately conducted an extensive investigation and located the killers' car in Sioux City, Iowa. It was registered in the name of David Keegan, well known in that area as a cafe and tavern operator. Within a few days Keegan's two accomplices were taken into custody and identified that individual as the man who had killed the farmer. Investigation showed that Keegan had fled the state and Federal warrants were filed, charging him with Unlawful Flight to Avoid Prosecution for Murder

as well as violating the Interstate Transportation of Stolen Property Statute, as he had transported the stolen contents of the safe from Iowa to South Dakota.

David Daniel Keegan was born on September 28, 1918, at Kingsley, Iowa, and is the product of a broken home. His parents were divorced when he was eight years old, and he lived with relatives on farms in various states. Although he has been employed as a bartender and taxicab driver, his main occupation has been as an owner and operator of cafes and taverns. Keegan has also been employed as a farmer, candy salesman on railroad trains, and hardware store clerk.

This fugitive is of medium build, 5 ft. 11 in. and weighs 159 pounds. He has black wavy hair which he combs frequently and bulging blue eyes which he rolls while talking. He has had continuous dental trouble and wears a partial lower plate of false teeth with several visible goldcap teeth. Keegan also suffers from a severe throat ailment, which causes the glands on the right side of his neck to swell visibly.

The fugitive has a reputation of being addicted to the excessive use of intoxicants. He smokes cigarettes moderately and is known to dress neatly, usually in sports clothing. When wearing a hat, Keegan has the habit of tipping it towards the back of his head. He is known to wear a black onyx ring bearing a small diamond and likes gambling and card games but is not a proficient gambler.

Keegan is a dangerous criminal and must be considered armed. It is also reputed that he has suicidal tendencies and great care must be taken in approaching this man.
