LIVING COST DOWN SLIGHTLY
Harrisburg - PMS - A slight decline in the cost of living for residents of the Keystone State - amounting to only .4 percent but still a drop - was noted for the past quarter, according to the Department of Labor and Industry.

Primarily responsible for the decline were lower prices for food and transportation, although such items as personal care, reading and recreation costs dipped also.

On the other hand, housing, apparel, medical care and miscellaneous goods and services were up. It was noted that the removal of the one per cent sales tax was also a contributing factor to the overall decline in living costs for the state.

On the food front the average retail prices declined 1.2 percent and down 1.6 per cent as compared with a year ago to the lowest level since December of 1950.

Contributing heavily were lower prices for meats, fish, poultry and fresh fruits and vegetables. Coffee, milk, eggs, sugar and some canned items were up.

Rental cost of apparel increased 1.4 per cent, reflecting in the main the return of seasonal items to the retail stores. Shoes, wool coats and suits, and men's shirts were priced higher.

One of the biggest drops is the field of transportation where a decline of three per cent was registered.

LOCAL LEGION HOME ROBBED OF \$100
The local Legion posthome was robbed of approximately \$100 Friday night it was reported. State Policeman Charles Simmons said entrance was gained through an unlocked basement window.

The thieves rifled two pinball machines, a cigarette machine and juke box to steal quarters, dimes and nickles. Warren J. Nelson, janitor, discovered the theft and notified Jack Germer, commander.

PENNSYLVANIA HAS VARIED AGRICULTURE
Pennsylvania agriculture is both specialized and diversified. That is the pattern revealed by the latest selections of six Master Farmers announced during the Farm Show this week in Harrisburg. Three of the superior farmers have purebred Holstein dairy cattle, but two of these also keep sheep, and laying hens, while one grows turkeys and another hogs. The fourth farmer is a purebred Guernsey man, but also grows hogs, produces eggs and cannery crops. The fifth specializes in turkeys, but also raises purebred Hereford beef cattle. And the sixth is both a heavy potato and a large egg producer, feeds steers and grows crops for a cannery.

The men were decorated with gold medals, in recognition of their achievements in agriculture and community affairs, at a luncheon in their honor. Corsages were given their wives in recognition of the indispensable part they played in their husbands' success. More than 150 agricultural leaders and Master Farmers attended the luncheon which was held at the Penn Harris Hotel in Harrisburg.

ELIZABETHTOWN DOWNED Donegal Cagers
Elizabethtown downed the Donegal Indians in a Section 1 contest Tuesday evening at Donegal, 55 to 40.
