

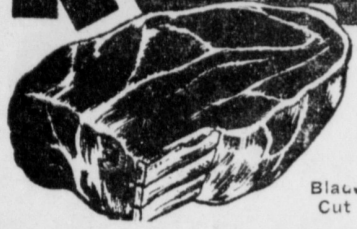

P. P. & L. REPORTS ON EARNINGS

Pro forma consolidated earnings of Pennsylvania Power & Light Company (including earnings of the former Pennsylvania Water & Power Company prior to June 1955 restated on the basis it was actually merged on June 1, 1955) and its subsidiary, The Scranton Electric Company, accruing to the common stock of Pennsylvania Power & Light Company for the twelve months ended November 30, 1955 were \$18,257,292, equivalent to \$3.09 per share of common stock outstanding at such date, as compared with \$17,036,918 or \$2.91 per share on the same proforma consolidated basis for the 12 months ended November 30, 1954.

Pro forma consolidated revenues for the twelve months ended November 30, 1955 were \$121,904,819, an increase of 8.2% over the pro forma revenues for the previous year.

Miss Hartman attended Conrad High School, Wilmington, Del., and Wooster College, Wooster, Ohio, and is now a student at Millersville State Teachers College.

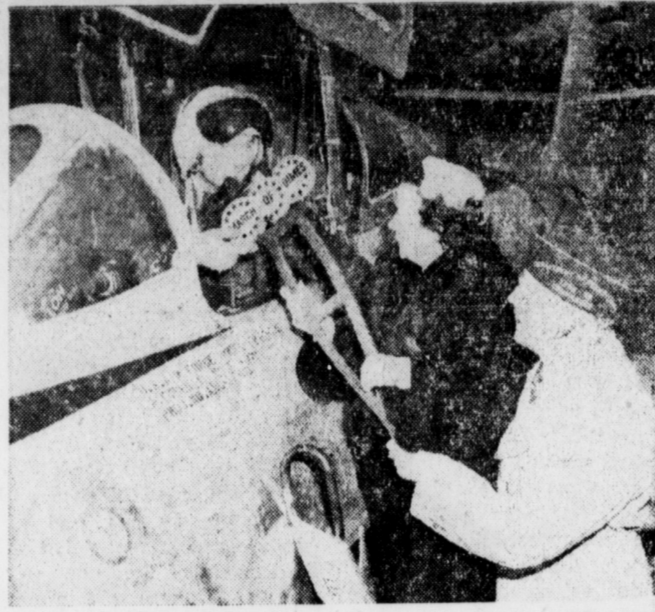

BUILDING ACTIVITY DROPS IN DECEMBER

HARRISBURG-PNS - Construction activity in Pennsylvania last month—both on the home construction front and the non-residential front—as might be expected fell off sharply due to continued cold weather.

Only 2140 residential units were started throughout the Keystone State last month as compared with 2737 new homes placed under construction in the preceding month.

Cost of these proposed new homes dwindled, dropping from \$34 million to around \$28 million. As a point of comparison, a year ago 1858 new homes were placed under construction costing an estimated \$23 million.

Last month's home building activity is expected to provide 2415 family units—down 20 per cent from the previous month—but up 23 per cent in comparison with a year ago.

In the non-residential building field only 604 new projects got under way last month in the state—a sharp drop from the 923 of the preceding month.

Oddly enough however, the cost of these new projects increased from \$14 million to \$26 million.

Basically this was caused by beginning of the construction of several large schools, a new
