WANTED BY THE FBI



Max Heimovitz

Two men were seated in the rear of an automobile parked on Fourth Street, south of Porter, in South Philadelphia on a hot August night in 1946. They were waiting for someone, and as they loitered they fanned themselves with their hats and discussed the latest baseball scores.

Suddenly the person whom they expected appeared, and as he rapidly moved toward their automobile, their smiles of greeting turned to expressions of terror as both men tried to scramble to safety. MAX HEIMOVITZ, the man for whom they were waiting, viciously opened fire with a .38 pistol instantly killing VICTOR RUGGERIO and severely wounding FRED HAMEL, the owner of the automobile.

The crowded South Philadelphia area was thrown into an uproar as people ran to avoid being hit by a stray bullet, and in the confusion MAX HEIMOVITZ disappeared and has not yet been found by the police since that August night. Philadelphia detectives determined that HEIMOVITZ, better known as MAX HERMAN, has been the man behind the gun and behind the gun and immediately a fragnet was put out in a vain effort to apprehend the murderer.

In 1948, information was received indicating that HERMAN or HEIMOVITZ, had left the state, and the FBI entered the investigation charging the fugitive with Unlawful Flight to Avoid Prosecution for Murder.

HEIMOVITZ was well-known as a numbers writer and part-time jewelry salesman, but the reason for the shooting was obscure. Some claimed that it was because of a personal grudge that MAX had against the two; others claimed that it was an offshoot of a local numbers writers' quarrel. The fugitive has a long criminal record dating back to 1932, and includes blackmail, extortion, carrying concealed deadly weapons, and operating an illegal lottery.

Relatives were greatly surprised at the shooting inasmuch as they considered MAX to be a meek and retiring individual, however, contacts with persons in the numbers racket showed that HEIMOVITZ had the reputation of being a very tough individual who stood for little interference.

He liked to dress well, spent money freely, and frequented the best night clubs. The fugitive had a habit of continually tearing paper matches in such a manner as to form small paper dolls and immediately he received the nickname of "The Paper Doll Killer."

This man must be considered dangerous and armed. Extreme caution should be used in any contact with him.

HEIMOVITZ was born Feb. 15, 1915, at Philadelphia, and as of 1946 was 5'6" in height; weighed 170 pounds; stocky build; dark brown hair; blue eyes; dark complexion. He has a dagger tattoo on the front of his left thigh and a two inch scar over the left eyebrow. HEIMOVITZ has also been known to wear a mustache.

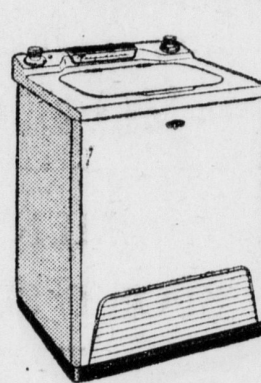
