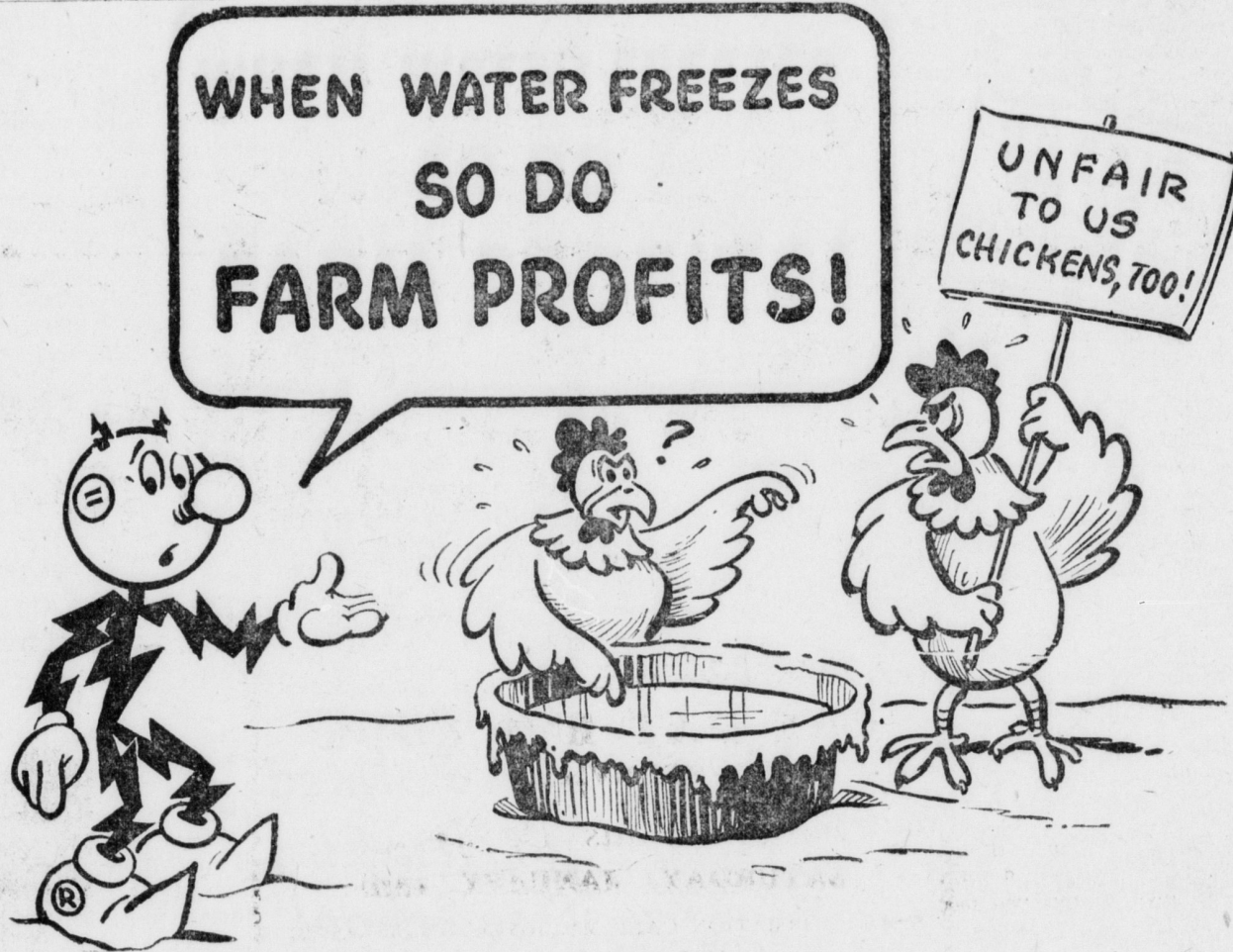
SCHOOL CONTRIBUTING TO MARCH OF DIMES

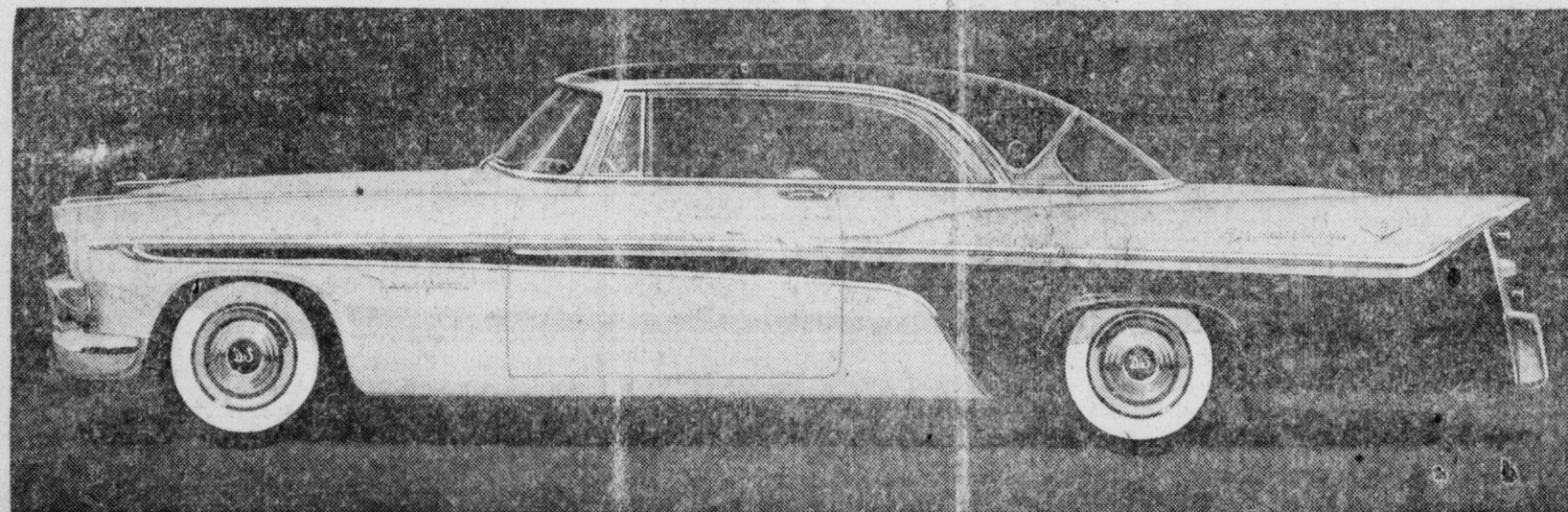
