Legislative Round-Up

Harrisburg — Pennsylvania's legislative machinery this week ground to a virtual halt—notwithstanding the fact that thirteen months of fiscal discord have elapsed—as both House and Senate slogged through inconsequential calendars.

Following last week's "walk out" by the Governor on the compromise sales-income tax program strainingly worked out by tight-lipped House Democrats and Republicans, Pennsylvania's lawmakers had no zest for other than routine matters.

Anti-administration lawmakers—giving in where technicality it was not their obligation to do so as the minority party—have washed their hands of any further concerted efforts to work out a tax program.

It now rests with administration forces which, while technically controlling the House, do not have control of the Senate—thus assuring continued defeat of any tax program without Republican assistance.

In fact party strategists now admit that it is doubtful if Democrats could muster sufficient strength among their own people to pass another tax program even in their own Democratic controlled House.

Lawmakers are glum this week as well they might be. Up for election in a few months many are now convinced that running on the record of the fantastic 1955-56 session will be close to fatal. It probably will.

After thirteen months of sessioning Pennsylvania continues to wallow in a fiscal swamp, from which at the moment there are no roads out, with little prospect of any being built.

Under this cloud the House and Senate stumbled through routine matters. New bills fitfully appearing on the legislative scene include these that would:
Limit the duties of county solicitors and authorize the appointment of solicitors by certain county officials;
Require the State to reimburse school districts and the districts to reimburse employees for interest paid on certain loans;
Further regulate the sale of forests and watershed areas;
Change compensation provisions with respect to borough & township tax collectors;
Change the penalties for motorists who fail to stop in the event of an accident;
Provide for further regulations for the passing of school busses;
Increase the appropriation for Pennsylvania's fourteen state teachers colleges;
Set up an appropriation for the Dept. of Welfare for use in treatment of mentally retarded children;
Provide for advance payments, reimbursements and tuition in the case of area technical schools.
