

## T-B Society Lists Schedule For X-Rays

All adults, and particularly parents are urged to take advantage of the chest x-ray service which is available thru the Tuberculosis Society of Lancaster Co.

This program is aimed at finding unknown tuberculosis, however, any other abnormal conditions noted on the x-ray are reported. It has been pointed out that active tuberculosis is more often found in adults than in children under 15 years of age. Therefore, everyone is urged to have a chest x-ray.

Recent reports indicate that in our county, undiscovered disease is present in many folks 55 and over.

Tuberculosis can and does strike any age, and children can develop pulmonary tuberculosis. However, it is much less common than among adults. It is fairly certain that a child who develops tuberculosis catches it from an adult, probably one in his immediate family. It seems best to prevent this by finding the hidden cases of tuberculosis among the adult population. Tuberculosis is not hereditary but adults can be passing on tuberculosis germs to children as well as to other adults, not knowing that they have the disease in active form.

One of the greatest difficulties in controlling tuberculosis is the fact that the disease has no obvious symptoms in the early stages, and yet it is communicable at any stage. Parents and grandparents should be particularly interested in the x-ray program to find the unknown cases of tuberculosis because its success will mean a safer family, a healthier community in which to raise their children.

The Tuberculosis Society also points out that other abnormalities such as tumors, heart conditions, etc. which may be found on the x-ray will also be reported.

The chest x-ray unit will be located on Main St., Mount Joy Friday March 9 from 4 to 8 p. m. The cost of the x-ray is \$1. However, in cases where individuals cannot afford this fee, the service will be given free of charge.

Thursday, March 7 — Marietta School, 4 to 8 p. m. - St. John's Church, Marietta, 1:45 p. m. Wyeth Laboratories.

Friday, March 9 — 9 a. m. Mt. Joy Borough School, 1 p. m. - Milton Grove School, 4 to 8 p. m. - Main St., Mt. Joy.

## Local Man Honored As Conservationist

John Melhorn, Donegal Spring Road, was honored at Lancaster County's Outstanding Conservationist of 1955 at a meeting of the Lancaster Co. Soil Conservation District last week in the Lampeter-Strasburg High School. He was presented with a plaque by Harry R. Metzler, former county commissioner and SCS director, who cited him for his conservation practices during the past twenty years.

Mr. Melhorn, who operates three farms, is also a township association director of the district.

Chairman Amos H. Funk, of Millersville R1, announced that the county district is the only one in the state working thru township directors and the only one working with implement dealers to accomplish conservation measures.

A total of 66 agreements covering 5,382 acres of land were approved in 26 townships during the year. Since the district was established, 1,192 initial conservation plans have been prepared. The number of plans needed in the county is 7,952.

## Eastern Area Civil Defense Meeting March 6

An Eastern Area-wide Civil Defense meeting will be held for County, Township and local Civil Defense Directors and their staffs in Allentown, 10:00 a. m. Tuesday, March 6, 1956.

The meeting will concern itself with essentially the same material as was given to county directors only at the January meeting. These topics are as follows:

1. Proposed survival plan projects;
2. Proposed changes in attack warning signals;
3. Proposed rules and regulations governing compensation for accidental injury; and
4. Proposed rules and regulations governing natural disaster operations.

The meeting will be held at the Lehigh County Civil De-

fense Control Center, 1201 Sumner Ave., Allentown, Pa. For the information of those driving, Sumner Avenue is easily located in Allentown by turning North from Hamilton St., which is the principal street of the city, eight blocks to Summer; or turning North from Tilghman St., which is Route 22, about two blocks. There is adequate parking space, and nearby restaurants. The meeting will adjourn at approximately 3:30 or 4 p. m.

This meeting will be conducted personally by Dr. Richard Gerstell, State Civil Defense Director, and it is urged that all efforts be made to have an excellent attendance. At this meeting opportunity will be given for directors to ask questions of general civil defense application.

eration of Business and Professional Women's Clubs.

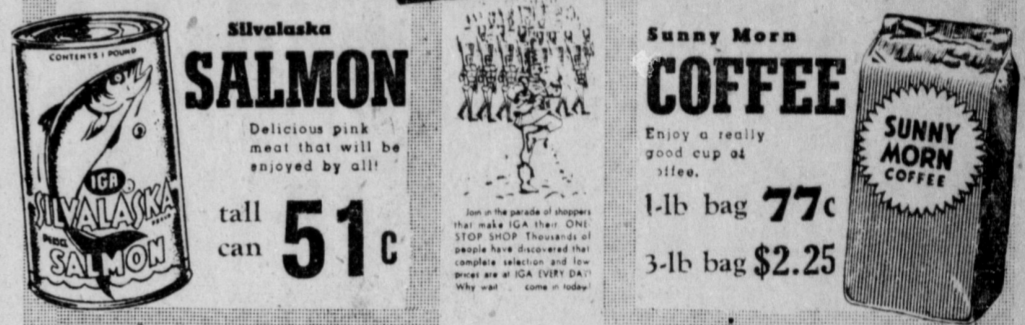
