## Social Security Domestic Help Reports Due Soon

Social security reports are due in April from housewives in Lancaster County who employ domestic workers, according to M. S. Gleaton, manager of the Lancaster district office, Social Security Administration. Housewives are required to make these reports during April on household workers paid as much \$50 in cash wages in January, February and March. This is the fifth quarterly report due since the new law covered household employees without regard to the number of days worked. Reports are sent to the District Director of Internal Revenue at Phila., Penna.

Work of cooks, maids, housekeepers, gardeners and other workers in a private household counts toward eligibility for retirement or death payments under old-age and survivors insurance if they are paid at least \$50 cash wages by one employer in a calendar quarter. If the household employee works long enough to be insured, benefits are payable in old age or to certain survivors in case of death.

Free booklets explaining the employer's obligation and benefits to the employee are available at the social security office located at 1024 Harrisburg Ave., Lancaster.

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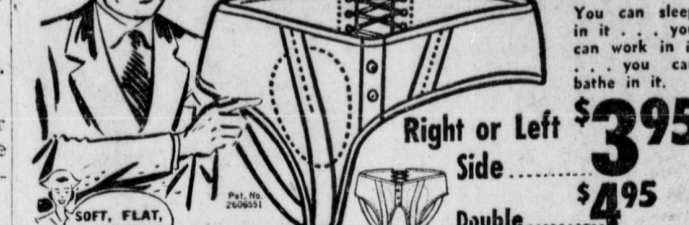
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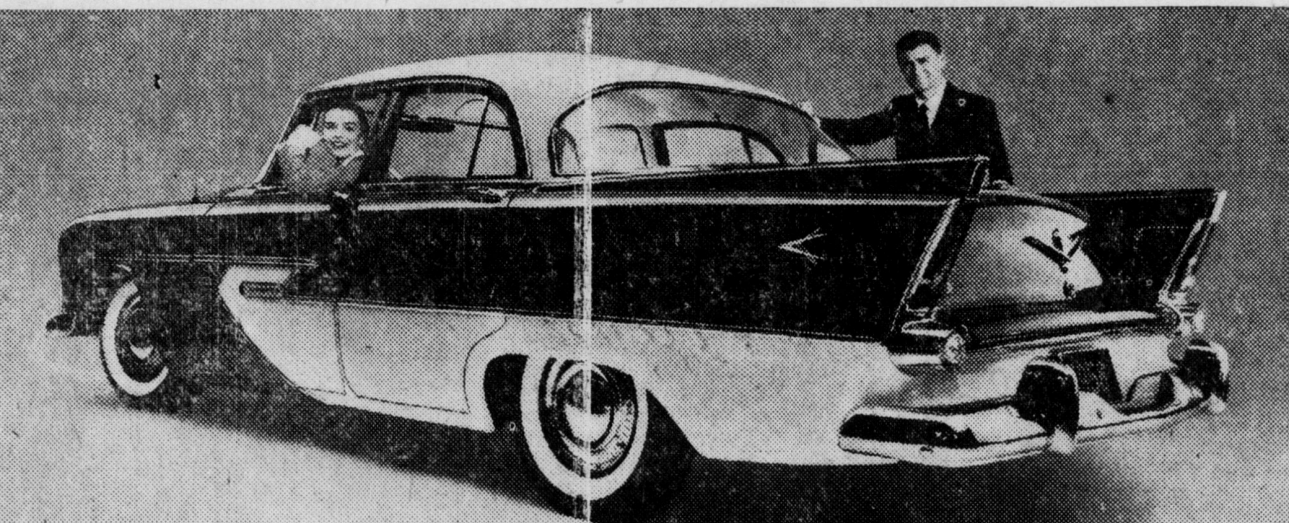
