Sico Company Plans More Storage Tanks

SICO Company officials announced this week that they will increase storage in their various locations. In Mt. Joy, two new tanks will be built near the present tanks along Manheim Street. These two will be increased by one-half million gallons of fuel oil.

In Lancaster, the storage will be increased by one-half million. The plant at Lemoyne and the plant at Carlisle will also have half million gallon storage tanks erected.

Board Sets Policy For Donegal High

Donegal High School board went on record at their regular meeting last Thursday to limit class trips to one day. The policy of the board states that a class may take one or two single day trips.

The board also decided to reverse the procedure of ordering supplies of the elementary schools. Each district will order individual supplies and books. The members also congratulated the educational committee on their progress.

The board agreed to a plan suggested by the committee headed by Paul Portner to set up a special program involving the top 20 percent of the students. Such students will receive a curriculum stressing science and mathematics.

New Jersey Rotarian Speaks Here

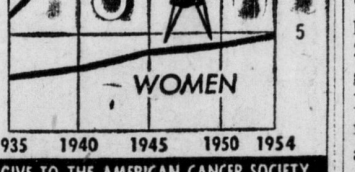

Sewer Costs Discussed At Joint Meeting

Tentative plans call for a joint meeting on Friday night of Mt. Joy Borough Authority and Borough Council with representatives of C. C. Collins & Co., fiscal agents, to complete details for the financing of the Mount Joy sewer project.

The meeting is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. in the council chambers. Long-awaited "how much is it going to cost?" question was answered at a joint meeting of the two groups on Monday night, when Engineer Joseph Michels reported that in conference with C. C. Collins & Co. a formula had been agreed upon.

This formula calls for: 1. An assessment of between \$4 and \$4.25 per front foot. 2. A \$200 connection fee. 3. A \$60 per year annual rental charge.

Mr. Michels stated that the fiscal agents informed him the usual assessment for sewer projects today is between \$7. and \$9.50 per front foot.

Close timing will be required to complete all details soon enough to award contracts before bid deadlines have expired.

The Authority already is working on 30-day extensions granted by bidders on the laying of the sewers; these extensions will run out March 31. Mr. Michels stated, however, that he had been assured by the contractors that the bids will stand until April 5.
