Handicapped Artists Contest Closes May 1

Five distinguished American artists have agreed to judge entries in the National Art Contest for Handicapped Amateur Artists, the first of its kind ever held in Pennsylvania and the United States, after it closes on May 1, the State Bureau of Rehabilitation reported today.

Contest application blanks can be obtained at the Bureau's ten District Offices, Altoona, DuBois, Erie, Harrisburg, Johnstown, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Reading, Wilkes-Barre and Williamsport, according to John R. Torquato, Secretary of Labor and Industry and Executive Officer of the State Board of Vocational Rehabilitation.

The judges include Earnest W. Watson, Miss Isabel Bishop, Frank J. Reilly, E. Franklin Wittmack, and Andrew Newell Wyeth, of Chadds Ford, Pa., all other members reside in New York.

The contest is open to all handicapped amateur artists, and Torquato urged that eligible Pennsylvanians should participate "and make a good showing for our great Commonwealth."

To be eligible, an entrant must not earn the major por-

tion of his income as an artist. The contestant's handicap must be such that his ability to function in everyday activity is substantially impaired by disease, congenital condition or injury.

Paintings must be sent to the Morris Morgenstern Foundation, 110 W. 57th Street, New York, N. Y., by May 1. Detailed instructions are included on the application blanks.

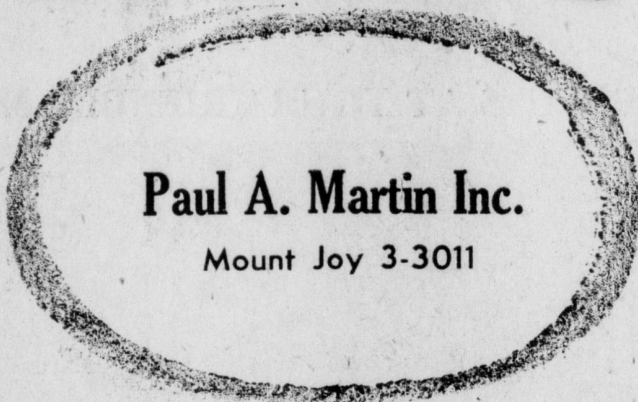

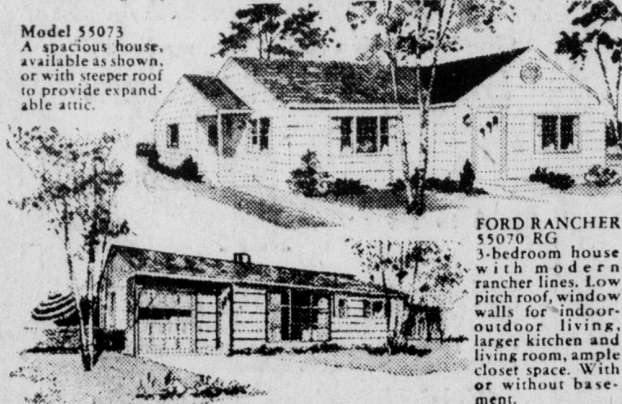

HARRISBURG ROUND-UP

Harrisburg — Pennsylvania's lawmakers this week continued plucking thorns from the legislative hides as a host of last minute tie-ups in fiscal and non-fiscal matters continued to hold up adjournment of the record-breaking 1955 session.

Again this week as last week proposed and necessary amendments to the now-enacted three per cent sales tax have heightened legislative bickering, confusion and some sterling partisan fighting.

Optimists, including some Democratic leaders, had hoped for an adjournment sometime next week, while others look for a mid-April or even a post-April 24 primary election date.

One of the chief points of argument since enactment of the sales tax has been whether the tax stamp plan should be included in the sales tax program. Opposition to the stamp

plan has been spearheaded largely by Senate Democrats — a move unlikely of any degree of success in view of the fact that this branch is controlled by stamp-insisting Republicans.

This week the House of Representatives is remaining in session for five full working days in a drive to clean up pending legislation in the lower branch preparatory for final adjournment.

In other legislative action, both houses have approved increased pension benefits for lawmakers, and going through the legislative mill this week is a proposal to increase the salaries and expenses of the lawmakers — the latter move felt in many quarters to be more than justified.

Somehow or other new bills continue to find their weary way into the legislative hopper

even though final adjournment is in the offing. With virtually no chance of passage here are some of the new legislative pieces appearing which would:

Redefine duties of officers having the powers of a committing magistrate and clerks of courts of record;

Amend the flood disaster act of last year to make additional

Pennsylvania areas eligible for emergency aid;

Revise duties and responsibilities of the Departments of Health and Public Instruction regarding Pennsylvania's School Health Program;

Prohibit public school employees from seeking elective offices;

Extend voting rights to cer-

tain physically handicapped veterans;

Authorize the Department of Revenue to purchase insurance in certain cases;

Increase the operators' license fee;

Permit ambulances, fire engines and similar emergency vehicles to use the turnpike without charge.
