



WORK BEGINS ON SEWER SYSTEM

Project Is Discussed At Rotary Club

Mount Joy's sewerage system, now under construction, was the subject of discussion at the Rotary club luncheon on Tuesday.

Samuel Miller, Borough Authority chairman, was in charge of the meeting. He introduced Engineer Joseph A. Michaels as the speaker of the day.

Mr. Michaels prefaced his remarks with praise for the cooperation of council and authority members in working out the details. He emphasized the fact that all major decisions had been made jointly by the two bodies.

The engineer explained that the first problem had been to work out a project and a financing plan that would be acceptable to the bonding companies.

On the south side of the borough the sewer lines will feed to the disposal by gravity. On the north side the lines will feed by gravity to a pumping station near the old mill at the eastern edge of town and from there the sewage will be pumped to the disposal plant.

Mr. Michaels stated that every effort will be made to get the work done as quickly as possible and with the least possible inconvenience to the public. He urged that property owners determine at once the location they desire for their curb connections, and place stakes, so that the contractors are not delayed.

The speaker said that the disposal plant had been designed to allow for any foreseeable expansion needs.

Financing will be handled Mr. Michaels declared, on the basis of a \$4.50 front foot assessment, \$200 connector fee and average \$60 yearly rental. Questioned on how double houses would be charged, the engineer replied they would be assessed the same as they would be if they were single units, each side paying a connection fee assessment and rental. He said also that apartment houses would be charged on a basis of \$60 rental for each family unit.

To the question on how the increasing use of detergents would affect operation of the disposal plant, Mr. Michaels stated there would be no problem if detergents were not used in excess. He assured his audience that any problem that might arise could be coped with.

Mr. Michaels said that the Authority is working with the contractors to assure prompt filling of the ditches after pipes are laid, so that no section will be inconvenienced for an undue length of time.
