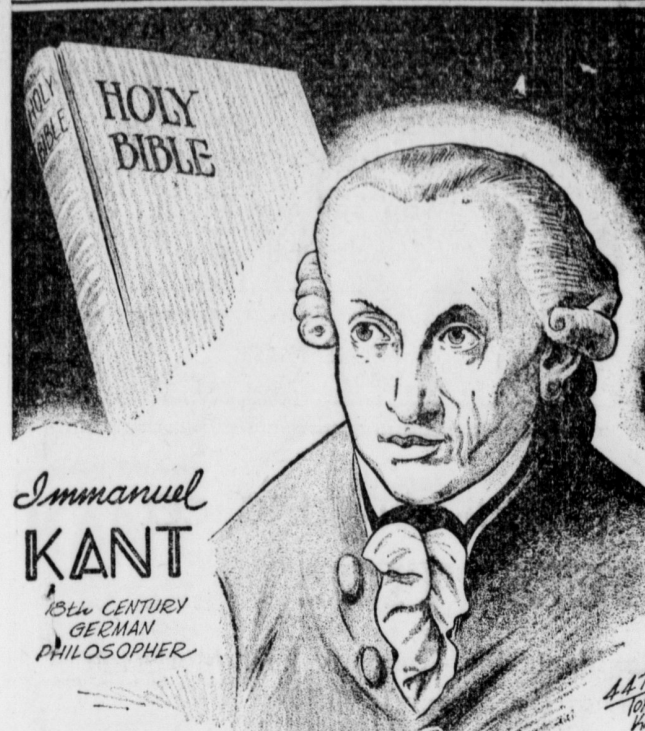

Florin Cubs Plan Pine Wood Derby

Earnings for both periods include earnings of former subsidiary, The Scranton Electric Company, (merged January 31, 1956) and restated earnings of the former Pennsylvania Water & Power Company (merged June 1, 1955) for applicable periods prior to merger.

Fort Knox, Ky. — Army Pvt. Charles R. Garlin, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Garlin, 8 Manheim St., Mt. Joy, is scheduled to leave the U. S. for Germany late next month as part of Operation Gyroscope, the Army's unit rotation plan.

Garlin's unit, the 3rd Armored Division, now stationed at Fort Knox, Ky., will replace the 4th Infantry Division in Europe.

A construction specialist in Company A of the division's 23d Engineer Battalion, he entered the Army in September 1955 and completed basic training at Fort Knox.
