

Hempfield High Will Graduate 63

Landisville-Salunga—Sixty-three seniors will receive diplomas of graduation from Hempfield High School at commencement exercises at the Landisville school Thursday, June 7th. This year's graduating class is the largest in recent years, and the second largest in the history of the high school.

The Rev. Kenneth Weaver of the Evangelical Congregational Church, Kinderhook, will deliver the Baccalaureate Sermon to the class on Tuesday, June 5th at the Hempfield High School auditorium. Rev. Ernest P. Leer, of the Landisville Zion Lutheran Church, will give the invocation. Ronald Dietz, a member of the graduating class, will sing a tenor solo, "Comfort Ye", and the Hempfield mixed chorus will sing "O Sing Unto Him" and "Let Their Celestial Concerts All Unite."

"Challenge To American Youth" will be the theme of the commencement exercises at the Hempfield High School auditorium June 7th. Four members of the graduating class will speak. They are Ruth Coyle, whose address will be on "Service"; Sarah Jane Springer, speaking on the topic, "Faith"; Wilbur Risser, "Courage"; and David Schlotzhauer, who will address the group on the topic, "Sense of Humor".

pastor. Pastors and lay delegates from this area include the Rev. W. L. Koder, Mt. Joy and the Rev. Ernest P. Leer of Landisville. They will join the nearly 700 other representatives of Synod's 627 congregations and 222,152 confirmed members in voting on establishing the office of full-time director of synodical Christian education. In recent years this important work in the Synod has been under the part-time leadership of the assistant to the president.

Dr. Dwight F. Putman, of Harrisburg, Synod president, will be in charge of the business sessions which open on Monday afternoon, May 21. All pastors and laity will join in the service of Holy Communion, Monday forenoon. Dr. Heinly, host pastor will be liturgist. President Putnam will preach the sermon.

The Synod will welcome the Rev. Dr. F. Eppling Reinartz as the official representative of the United Lutheran Church in America. Dr. Reinartz, ULCA secretary, will address the Convention Tuesday and Wednesday forenoons. He will address laymen of the church as a mass meeting Tuesday evening. The visit of Dr. Reinartz will be of special interest because of the twentieth biennial Convention of the ULCA to be held in Harrisburg October 10-17, 1956.

Howard L. Logan, of New York, ULCA Brotherhood president, will address the synodical laymen's organization later in the evening. Delegates will act on setting the age of retirement for its officers, and on defining the number of terms officers may serve. Another important action will decide the time and the place of the ordination of pastors. At present most ordinations take place at the annual conventions of Synod. A change in the policy would provide for more ordinations in local congregational situations.
