

HARRISBURG ROUND-UP

Harrisburg — Pennsylvania's lawmakers as they struggle fitfully during the week through the dying hours of the 1955-56 session have unquestionably emerged as a somewhat sad and befuddled group.

Hot on the legislative agenda was a series of "conference" bills — bills that held sharp differences of opinion between House and Senate wishes, bills that had to be resolved with specially appointed conference committees.

Such top legislative pieces as the sales tax stamp plan, increased pay for Pennsylvania's school teachers, increased pay for state officials, lawmakers themselves and judges, widening the scope of the multi-million-dollar flood disaster coverage program — all of those and a host of other controversial items headed into conference committees.

One by one the lawmakers passed the measures to grind out the dying days of the abortive and record-long '55 session.

Increasingly, Governor Leader at his last press conference, when asked again what he would do about the teacher pay increase bill told the newsmen he still was undecided as to what his course of action would ultimately be.

As for signing or not signing the measure, he would only say:

"At this point I can't say whether I will or whether I won't. The whole thing is still somewhat fluid."

On the general appropriation bill — covering normal operating expenses of state government — which the Legislature cut, when asked how it looked to him, the Governor replied:

"It looks disastrous for some of the departments."

On the worn out sales tax issue, when asked by a reporter whether he would be satisfied with an extension of the tax stamp deadline to January 1, 1957 rather than the July 1 date as originally proposed, the Governor peered owlishly through his glasses and quipped:

"I'll never be satisfied with the tax stamp plan as far as I'm concerned if they set it back to the year 2000."

As the 1955 Legislature was going into its flogging up convulsion, a newsman asked him whether there was any possibility of a special session being called in December this year to knock out the sales tax if Democrats in November gain control of both houses.

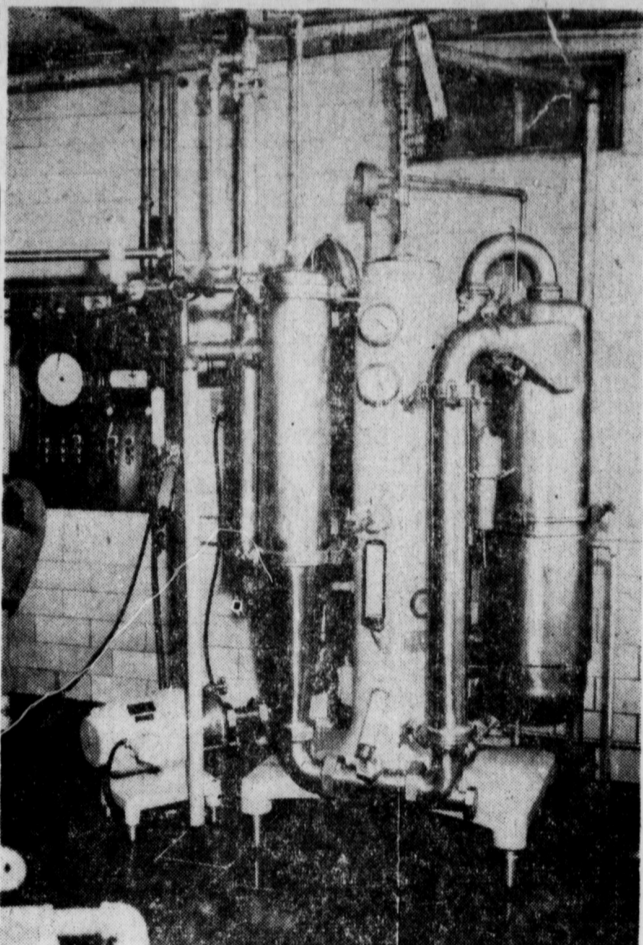
This apparently caught the Governor off guard as he thought for a moment before replying:

"I don't feel I'm in very good position to discuss that right now. I'll cross that when I get there — if I last that long!"

The consensus of opinion among observers here on Capitol Hill was that with the determined opposition the present Democratic administration has to the sales tax — a special session in December not too far fetched after all, should Democrats win both the House and Senate in November!

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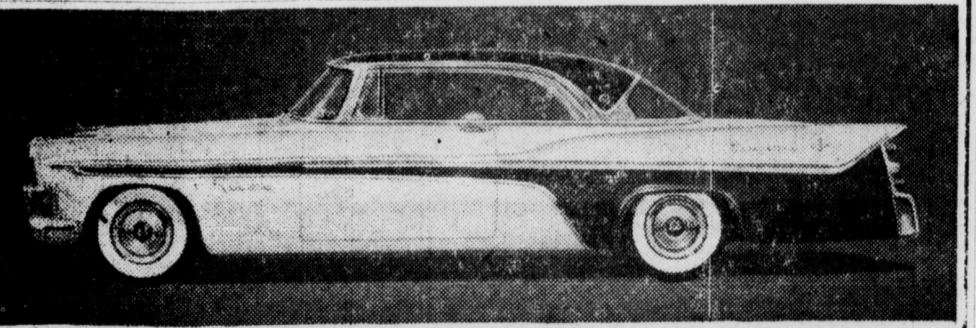
