State Chamber Opposes Change In Social Security

Harrisburg -PNS- The Pennsylvania Chamber of Commerce this week went on record as firmly opposing what is termed costly changes in Social Security coverage currently under consideration by Congress.

The Chamber asserted that such a move would drive up CASH payroll taxes of both individuals and employers. At present workers and employers pay a two per cent tax on the first \$4,200 of wages and the self-employed pay 3 per cent.

The Chamber expressed firm opposition to two provisions of the congressional proposal which is said to be "heavily flavored with political appeal but are bad in principle."

The provisions referred to would reduce the qualifying age of women for Social Security benefits from 65 to 62 and would make such benefits payable to totally and disabled workers at age 50.

The proposed 62-year qualifying age for women would not only increase benefit expenditures by a half-billion dollars a year but it would run counter to recent employment trends, the Chamber declared.

"Since the Social Security program was established, the life expectancy of women has increased over 9 years and in the past fifteen years the proportion of women between 60 and 64 who are working has almost doubled, the Chamber declared.

Lots Of Water Is Consumed

Harrisburg - PNS - Average daily consumption of ground water throughout Pennsylvania amounts to more than one-half billion gallons, the Department of Internal Affairs said.

Largest concentrated withdrawals of ground water in the state — that is non-surface water contained in rivers, streams and lakes — is found in the industrial areas of Philadelphia and Pittsburgh.

The department pointed out that it is certain that the demand for ground water will increase sharply in the coming years — which may well have serious effects on the supply available.

It was noted that growing communities, along with new and expanding industries will require ever-increasing supplies.

"Perhaps the largest increase in use will occur in the rural areas as more and more farmers take advantage of cheap electrical power to supply automatic water systems, modern sanitary facilities in their homes, and irrigation systems in their fields," the department commented.

It was pointed out that the availability of ground water to supply present and future needs is determined basically by the occurrence and character of fresh water-bearing beds, and secondly by the "extent to which the natural conditions have been impaired by the actions of man."

Importance Of Accurate Scales Is Emphasized

Harrisburg -PNS- The importance of having accurate weighing scales from both the customer and seller standpoint was underscored this week by the Department of Internal Affairs.

It was pointed out for example that a scale in error only one ounce would accumulate a one-pound gain — or loss — for every sixteen weighings, or better than six pounds for every 100 weighings.

"Whether the product is beefsteak, or coal, apples or gasoline, it is essential that the weighing or measuring device be accurate in order to give both the seller and the purchaser a fair deal," commented Harry M. Turrell, director of the department's Bureau of Standard Weights and Measures.

Weight inspectors are constantly checking weighing devices in stores and all kinds of business operations throughout the state.

"State inspectors are trying to do a conscientious job of protecting both the dealer and the purchaser, but cooperation from the public will make their task easier and more fruitful," he said.

He pointed out that a good way for the consumer to protect himself when purchasing coal is to insist on receiving a copy of the weighmaster's certificate, which the dealer is legally required to deliver to the purchaser.

Youth Leaders At National C-D Meeting

In a further move to interest the young people of America in taking a more active role in Civil Defense, Federal Civil Defense Administrator Val Peterson has invited 15 youths, all leaders of national organizations, to attend the first Young People's Civil Defense Conference July 12 and 13 in Battle Creek, Michigan.

Organizations represented include the National Student Council Association, New Homemakers of America, Future Homemakers of America, New Farmers of America, Future Farmers of America, YWCA, YMCA, Catholic Youth Organization, 4-H and YMW (Young Men and Women) Programs, Girl Scouts, Camp Fire Girls, Boys Clubs of America, Girls Clubs of America, and the National Society of the Children of the American Revolution. The youth leaders will be asked to evaluate and recommend civil defense programs suitable for their respective organizations.

The first day of the conference will be devoted to civil defense briefings and a tour of FCDA's Control Center and Communications Center. During the second day the young people will discuss how civil defense activities can help their own organizations in meeting their goals and objectives.
