Donegal Airport News

This month of July marks the tenth anniversary of the Donegal Airport. It was during July 1946 that George, Jim, and Bill Endsow cleared away the freshly baled wheat straw from through the center of the field that is now the airport runway, and the first landing was made there. Shortly thereafter the hangars were erected, the field was inspected by State and Federal officials and a license granted authorizing commercial operations. Student pilot training was started at once and has ever since been a major activity at the field. Other activities are charter flights, airplane rides, storage and maintenance of privately owned, aerial sound system and aircraft sales.

Ten years ago flying was considered a hobby only. Airplanes were for the wealthy 'sportsmen pilots' who found flying interesting but did not expect to derive utility from their craft. However, a great change has come about during the last five years or so. Industry has adopted the airplane as a practical means of transportation. Small one man businesses, medium sized industries, and large multi-million dollar corporations, all are buying and using airplanes, from the smaller single engine Piper tri-Pacer or Cessna 170 on up to the Douglas DS-3 and other airline type equipment. A whole flock of new 'light twins' has been developed and finds a ready market: the Piper 'Apache' at \$35,000, the Cessna '310' at \$55,000, the Beechcraft 'Twin Bonanza', the De Havilland 'Dove', the 'Aero Commander', one of which President Eisenhower uses for his Gettysburg flights, all are filling the need for fast, dependable transportation of the nation's top executives.

Although the company owned airplane has not yet become a reality for local business firms, we do not have to look far to see it in use. In York, Bowen-McLaughlin, S. Morgan Smith, Dentist's Supply, R. S. Noonan, Carew Steel, and Campbell Chain are firms using company owned planes.

And, although some consider Lancaster County a little old fashioned, we do have some company owned airplanes here too. Progressive minded firms such as Armstrong Cork, New Holland Machine, Eshelman Feed, and Animal Trap Co. have owned planes for some years. Newer users are E. R. Noll, H. R. Miller & Co., and McMinn Industries. And so it is going, competition forces the adoption of more efficient methods, and old fashioned ways of travel are giving way to the airplane.

On a recent chick delivery flight into New York state we had planned one of the stops at the airport close by a town of about 12,000 population, but just before departure we learned that the airport was no longer in operation, and an alternate airport at a smaller town was selected for the delivery. It is difficult to understand, considering the growing use of business airplanes, how even a small town can afford to be without at least some sort of airport facilities. Business men using airplanes frequently felt their strongest impressions of a community by the type of service and facilities they encounter at the local airport.
