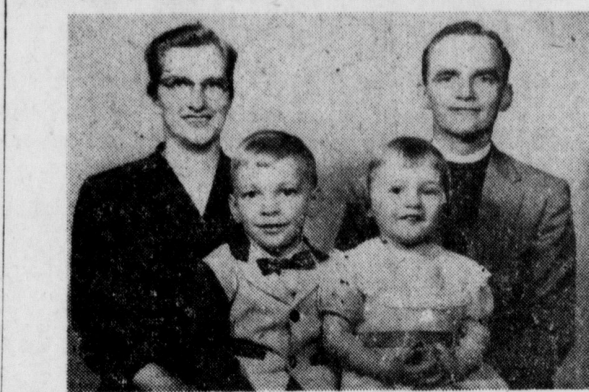
The group also made available the grounds at the home for picnics for members and their families and groups. Interested persons may contact the steward to make arrangements.

Director Explains Course Of Study

Announcement has been made on the progress of students in the instrumental music program at Donegal High School by H. Morrell Shields, instructor. After students have completed a beginners' method book on their particular instruments which takes one or two years, they are given lessons according to the Gerald Prescott method.

Mr. Prescott is the author of a course of study in which he completely outlined a study for each instrument and graded all existing standard books in the proper order. Mr. Prescott is the director of bands at the University of Minnesota. Some of the study course cover 4 years of work and some continue thru twelve years of work.

A year's work is divided into 36 weeks of study. A student can tell what his lesson will be for any week for the next 4 to 12 years. Mr. Prescott also set up an award system as motivation for study. Following several preparatory pins, a bronze pin is presented upon completion of the first, second and third years; silver for the fourth, fifth and sixth years; gold for seventh, eighth and ninth years; a bronze key for the tenth; silver key for eleventh; and gold key for completing twelve years of study.

Average Is Four Since most students begin the course of study around the sixth or seventh grade, the average numbers of years completed has been approximately 4. Mr. Shields did have one student in the past who completed twelve complete years of study. Warren Chaney of Columbia. He states that the completion of 4 years of study is considered good progress. (A student may complete a year's work in less time if he does the extra work.)

Local Boy Past Fifth Robert Reich, East Main Street, is the furthest advanced of any students in the school's instrumental program at the school. Robert, who will be a junior next year has completed 5 years of work on the drums thus far.

Other students with marked progress are Jerry Buchenauer, New Haven Street, who has completed 4 years work on the marimba. Kay Kauffman has completed two years, 12 weeks on flute; Karen Baker, 2 years, 12 weeks on alto saxophone; Jackie Rahm, 2 years on marimba; Douglas Fish, 1 year, 6 weeks, clarinet; Kathleen Goodall, 1 year, 24 weeks, trumpet; Barry Barnhart, 1 year, 18 weeks, baritone; Jerry Rutt, 1 year, 6 weeks, trombone; Loretta Hornafius, 1 year, 6 weeks, clarinet; Joanne Bixler, 1 year 12 weeks, oboe; Robert Buchenauer, 1 year, 6 weeks, trumpet and Tony Martin, 1 year 3 weeks, trumpet.
