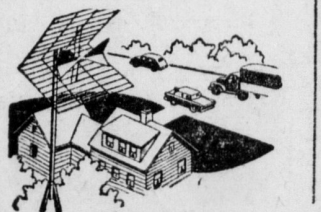

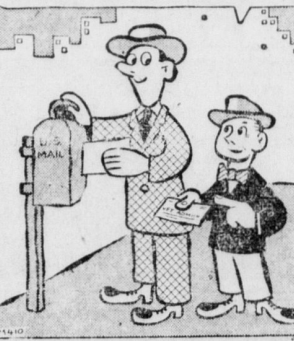

### PP&L Suggests New Standard Electric Service

The rapidly increasing use of electrical appliances in homes throughout Central Eastern Pennsylvania and the still greater use anticipated for the years ahead, has prompted Pennsylvania Power & Light Company to urge all customers, contractors, suppliers and builders to adopt a higher standard for new electric service entrances and necessary protective equipment.

In announcing the new desirable minimum for service entrances, Mr. G. T. Storb, division vice president, said it calls for an increase in the size of the wires that makes up the capacity of the service entrance and the installation of protective equipment having at least 100 amperes of capacity.

Behind the upward revision of these minimums is the local utility's desire that homeowners enjoy the greatest possible efficiency from electric appliances they now own or plan to add in the future.

Mr. Storb went on to explain that the service entrance is of vital importance in the customer's home wiring system.

The size of the wires comprising the customer's service entrance determines the amount of electricity that can be brought into the home from the point where the electric company's wires are connected to the customer's home, and the initial installation of at least the minimum service entrance facilities will save many customers the expense of increasing service entrance capacity when future appliances are added.

The second part of the electric service entrance is the protective equipment . . . the panel housing the branch circuit breakers or fused switches. This equipment serves as the junction point from which electricity is dispatched to various parts of the house.

The service entrance equipment should match the capacity of the service entrance wires. If it is too small, the advantage of having large-enough service entrance wires is lost since the capacity of the fuses or circuit breaker governs the amount of electricity that can flow over the rest of the customer's home wiring system. Thus, according to the new PP&L recommendation, service entrance installations should have a capacity of at least 100 amperes so that the customers may receive the fullest possible benefits from their present electrical equipment and provide for future additions.

### Donegal Airport News

Earl Binder of Allentown flying a Tri-Pacer visited Donegal Airport last Tuesday. Mr. Binder, who is with Wenz Memorials, uses the plane in keeping close touch with Wenz representatives around the country.
