Living Costs

Show Increase
Harrisburg - PNS - An increase of 1.1 per cent in the living costs for Pennsylvania families was reported this week.

On the food front retail food prices jumped .7 per cent during the past quarter in Pennsylvania — but they were still 1.4 per cent below a year ago at the same time.

Higher prices for fresh vegetables and pork were primarily responsible for the increase during the quarter, supplemented by advanced prices for coffee, fats and oils, and restaurant meals.

However lower prices were recorded for beef, veal, milk, eggs and chickens.

Clothing prices for Keystone State families went up one per cent — 4 per cent over the corresponding time a year ago. The increase was due mainly to higher prices for shoes, although some items of men's and boys' clothing were also higher in price.

Household operation costs increased .8 per cent, reflected mainly in upped costs for laundry soaps and detergents and higher rates for domestic services in some areas of the state.

Residential rents edged up .5 per cent to a level 1.2 per cent above a year ago at this time. Transportation expenses averaged an increase of .7 per cent but this was .8 per cent below a year ago.
