

French Creek Park Interesting Week-end Trip

Weekend trips call for reasonable mileage, with all possible variety and proper emphasis upon scenery, history and novelty. This jaunt takes up to Hopewell Furnace at Hopewell Village and surrounding French Creek State Park some of the loveliest of the gently rolling country in rolling country in southeastern Pennsylvania, which also boasts such intriguingly named hamlets as Monaca Station, Scarlets Mill and Birdsboro.

Most motorists probably regard as mere heaps of stone and brick the old furnaces which dot Eastern Pennsylvania's landscape. Hopewell Furnace proves otherwise. Now a historic site, Hopewell guarantees an absorbing backtrack 200 years of American history with buildings, products and working models to illustrate it.

Donegal Airport News

Clyde Faus, Manheim R.I. is practicing on takeoff and landings, steep turns, stalls, slips, and spirals. Clyde will be taking his flight test for private pilot license in a week or so, provided we get a little more of the kind of weather needed for student flying. J. Newcomer, Elizabethton, has taken his first ground school lesson from instructor Leon Alleman. This lesson consists of an explanation of the proper use of the controls, throttle, instruments, and routine pre-flight inspection. The proper starting and running of engines, and briefing on local air traffic rules, also is included in the first lesson. Signald Sameth and Donald Schwanda of Hackettstown, N. J. stopped in for gas last week in their Taylorcraft. Freddie Ferruci is the sales representative for Central Aero Supply and uses a Cessna 170 to make his rounds, and operates out of the North East Philadelphia Airport. Freddie uses the plane to deliver many of the orders and has carried two 30 gallon drums of refinishing materials at a time. Rather cumbersome to handle into and out of a small plane, but this fast delivery service is much appreciated by his customers. Carl Eby is another salesman who flies a company airplane. Mr. Eby frequently visits Donegal airport, and on his latest stop here was flying a new Cessna 172, the tricycle landing gear version of the well known 170 model. This new 172 model is already very popular because of the ease of operation, the tricycle landing gear making landings almost automatic. So easily done the Cessna Company calls it the 'Land-O-Matic' Cessna 172. Harold Rineer, Lancaster, who earned his pilot 'ticket' at Donegal has enlisted in the U. S. Air Force and will go to a Texas base early in August.

We have given a good deal of consideration to a 'sample' flight course but have never done much about it, but now are giving the idea further study. Have just received Aeronautics Bulletin No. 19 from the University of Illinois entitled 'Flight Experience Course for Teachers and Businessmen,' which describes an abbreviated flight course developed there. The course consists of about eight hours of instruction in basic flight maneuvers, culminating in three supervised solo flights around the local traffic pattern, all done in a small tandem seated trainer. Following the solo flight transition is made to a four place business type plane, and a cross country trip is made during which a landing is made at a large airport, where visits are made to the control station, and the airline terminal. The course is intended to demonstrate to prospective users of private airplanes the actual conditions involved and to enlighten teachers concerning such usage so that they may pass along to students the knowledge gained by taking the course.

Thus, the early furnaces and forges flourished where the iron ore existed and men had the vision, courage and capital to launch them. Hopewell has retained a sizable fraction of its original installation, including the huge old charcoal house, the ironmaster's great home, several tenant houses and other items of interest. A comprehensive restoration program is underway and someday Hopewell Village will be a full-scale model of a little remembered aspect of Colonial life.

French Creek State Park, immediately adjoining, is a heavily forested 5240 acres, whence came most of the ore and all of the charcoal for Hopewell Furnace. It has been developed as a recreation area for public use. Sixty-two acre Hopewell Lake is a popular boating, swimming and fishing spot. Good roads and ample parking space, hiking trails and bridge paths add to the park's attractiveness. There are group camps with excellent cabin accommodations, trailer sites and tenting facilities.

The Park boasts a tremendous variety of beautiful trees, shrubs and wild flowers and is a sanctuary for deer, fox, rabbit, raccoon and other small animals. Great flocks of migratory birds seek shelter in Park All in all, a delightful spot for the whole family to visit and enjoy.

Voters To Register In August

Residents of the area will be given a chance to register for the November presidential election this summer. The Lancaster County Registration Commission has set up 72 special registration sites throughout the county. The campaign will begin Monday, August 13 and continue through Sept. 8. The deadline for registering is Sept. 17.

The registrars will sit at the respective sites from 10 a. m. until 3 p. m. and from 7 to 10 p. m. to receive new registrations and changes of address. The registration is all voters who become twenty-one years on or before November 7. Anyone in this group will be eligible to register and cast their vote November 6.

The commission emphasized that registration at the special sites is not limited to the residents of the political subdivision in which the special registrars are sitting. Any resident of the city and county can enroll at any of the special registration centers.

Area sites set up for the special purpose are, H. S. Newcomer Hardware Store, Friday, Aug. 18; Bender's Garage, Milton Grove, for the Milton Grove district of Mount Joy Twp., August 15; Florin Fire Hall for lower district of Mount Joy Township August 24; Maytown Fire Hall, for East Donegal Twp., Aug. 13; Landisville Fire Hall for East Hempfield Twp., Sept. 1.

Home Accident Rate Is High

Harrisburg -PNS- If you have to take a tumble or a spill around the house — fall carefully and gently, might well be the gist of a warning offered this week by the Pennsylvania Department of Health.

Underscoring the point, a department spokesman told Penna. News Service that during the past year of some 1900 deaths resulting from accidents in the home in Pennsylvania last year — more than 50 per cent were caused by falls.

The department said that some 1300 such home deaths were recorded during the year — with about 80 per cent caused by falls in the home by persons in the age bracket of 65 and over. Accidental poisoning, according to the department, accounts for less than 6 per cent of all accidental home deaths. Here are some significant figures:
