WANTED BY THE FBI



Henry Randolph Mitchell

The FBI Ten Most Wanted Fugitive Program has met with wonderful success as the public wholeheartedly joined in law enforcement's effort to protect society from the underworld. There has been a terrific turnover in the names of those who make this infamous list, and there is only one left from the original published list. He is Henry Randolph Mitchell, the bank robber with the crooked right little finger.

Numerous reports have come to FBI Headquarters that Mitchell is dead, but the G-Men continue their search inasmuch as the only circumstances which can stop an FBI search is definite proof that the man is deceased, in jail, or has grown too old to reasonably exist.

Mitchell is wanted for the holdup of a bank in Williston Florida, on the afternoon of January 21, 1948. The bank had reopened for the afternoon at 1 p. m. when two men, both wearing several days growth of beard, swiftly entered the front door closing it behind them. They drew pistols and ordered the employees to lie on the floor while they robbed the cash boxes of \$10,353 which they put into a laundry bag. Warning against an outcry, they fled.

Investigation showed that Henry Randolph Mitchell was one of the bank robbers.

His companion was quickly apprehended, but Mitchell remained at large. During his career he has been convicted in numerous states for grand larceny, violation of narcotic laws, breaking and entering, and forgery.

FBI officials regard him as a veteran criminal whose livelihood has been derived by his raids on society. The fugitive is reported to be an enthusiastic follower of the race tracks and is a daring gambler. He is also said to be armed and must be considered dangerous.

On September 27th, 1956, Mitchell will celebrate his sixty-first birthday, and he is described as five feet five inches tall weighing 155 pounds, brown eyes, grayish brown hair, short stocky build. He has a one inch scar on the left inside wrist, a small cut scar on the inside edge of his left eyebrow, and a mole on his right cheek, and his right little finger is stiff and crooked.
