Rabies Cases Are Found In County

Rabies is a disease of the nervous system, particularly the brain. In the human the symptoms are headache, fever and a sense of apprehension. As the disease progresses, spasm of the muscles of swallowing occurs and swallowing becomes impossible. This may first be noted in the inability of the patient to swallow water. The course of the disease progresses to delirium and convulsions and eventually to death. The same physical signs can be noted in animals having Rabies. However, Rabies may be present in animals in the quiet type in which the animal is simply sick, has difficulty in swallowing and dies without the alarming wild symptoms of biting and attacking anything with which it comes in contact. Rabies is a disease of biting animals, dogs, cats, foxes, skunks and other biting animals.

The cause of the disease is the Virus of Rabies, that is present in the saliva of rabid animals. The saliva of such an animal can transmit Rabies without a bite from the animal, if it comes in contact with an open wound on the skin surface, but is ordinarily transmitted by a bite. The location of a bite is important, the nearer to the brain the more dangerous it is, so that bites of the face, neck and hands are particularly dangerous. Bites occurring through clothing are less dangerous in the infected saliva may be wiped off as the teeth of the animal penetrates the clothing.

The virus of rabies can be found in the brain of animals dying of the disease. It usually takes about 4 to 6 weeks following the bite for the disease to develop in the human, and in dogs and other biting animals, it may take 6 months. Animals that have rabies usually die in about 10 days. All animals known to have bitten people or other animals, should be restrained for a period of 10 days. The heads of all animals which are known to have bitten people or animals and which died later, should be sent to the State Dept. of Agriculture Laboratories, in the case of wild animals through the game commissioner and domestic animals through the State Dog Law Enforcement Officer.

Actually there have been nine cases of rabies in cows to date in this county. Three farms have been placed under 100 days quarantine by the Dept. of Agriculture.

Five patients have been treated with Semple Vaccine. One patient refused the Vaccine.

The reason for bringing the subject of Rabies to the attention of the residents of Lancaster County at this time, is the increasing occurrence of Rabies in animals in the county, particularly in the southeast section.
