



Mount Joy Junior Chamber Plans Community Picnic Aug. 8 At Rocky Springs

For the second year, the Mount Joy - Florin - Newton Community Picnic will be held at the Rocky Springs park, Wednesday, Aug. 8, has been set as the date for the picnic as planned by the local Junior Chamber of Commerce.

As announced last year, the park will offer advantages for the annual affair. Any child or adult may purchase one ticket for \$1 which entitles him to ride any of the rides in the park for three hours. The dollar tickets will be in use from 7 to 8:30 p. m. and as many rides as the holder wishes to take in that period of time is his privilege.

The rides in the park include a ferris wheel, roller coaster, fun house, coddle-up, merry-go-round, whip miniature railroad, auto scooters, and airplanes. All facilities of the park will be turned over to the local picnickers for the day.

Arrangements have also been made with park officials in case of rain. Both the ballroom and the roller skating rink will be open to the public. Special rates will be in effect at the pool for the day. Tickets for the pool are to be purchased at the park office. Adults will be admitted on a 35c ticket and the children for 15c.

The club room, located near the entrance of the park will be for the use of mothers with small children. Both television and cots will be available.

A game period will be sponsored by the Jaycees for the children. The time will be announced at a later date. Continuing the same feature as in other years, a golf tournament will be held. This year one new tournament will be sponsored. A bowling tournament will be conducted in the new 32-alley building. A baseball game with the local Midgets will also be included on the program of the day.

Bus transportation will be provided to the park for persons from the three communities. Tickets may be purchased in advance from various stores in the area.

Gene Eicherly is general chairman of the picnic; his committee includes Charles Johnson, John Miller and Gerald Hostetter. Mr. Hostetter will have charge of the golf tournament and Michael Pricio will have charge of the bowling tournament. Prizes will be awarded in the two tournaments and also for the children's games.

Budget Is Accepted By Board

A revised budget calling for estimated expenditures of \$423,440 was adopted at the last week's meeting of the Donegal High School board. The revision was necessary due to the new state teacher salary ruling. Certain items planned to be purchased were postponed for one year to make the revision.

A library survey taken among the students at the close of the school term was announced. The survey had been conducted to check the advisability of opening the school library one day per week during the summer months. Since there was not enough response for the summer project, it was dropped. The library report revealed that an average of 1,317.88 books were checked out of the library per month with 12.55 books per student for the year. The total number of books taken out during the year was 10,543.

Three resignations were accepted. John Shaeffer resigned to accept a fellowship at the University of Chicago where he will work on his masters degree. The other two resignations were Mrs. John Muir, Frank Street, and Miss Beverly Hays of Lancaster. One new faculty member was named, Fredrick L. Malmberg, Landisville, was named to teach in the junior high school. Mr. Malmberg graduated from Hempfield High School and Elizabethtown College.

Contracts for general supplies, art, and paper were awarded to L. B. Herr and Company, Lancaster; industrial and agriculture shop supplies to Fulton-Mehring, York; John Matlack, of Camden, N. J.; Broadhead-Garrett, Cleveland, O.; and Sears, Roebuck Company, of Philadelphia; medical and dental supplies from the Allied Surgical Company, Lancaster.

A new policy of pupil accident insurance was set up by the board. The Sterling Accident Insurance Company with local agent, Franklin Zink was named. The price of the policy which covers the student for one year and paid by the parents will be \$1.25 per year.

Lancaster County Milk Income Tops \$23 Million

Harrisburg Lancaster's cow population stepped forward again during 1955 as a major wage-earner. Lancaster County's income from milk was \$23,069,347 during the year according to figures released by the Pennsylvania June Dairy Month Committee and Pennsylvania Bureau of Crop Reporting & Research.

N. E. Sampson, chairman for the Pennsylvania JDM Committee, in releasing the figures said, "Because our state is so industrialized, with steel and other industries gaining much more public recognition, few Pennsylvanians realize the Commonwealth ranks in the top three as a milk consuming state and among the top five as a milk producing state in the nation."

Sampson pointed out that in Lancaster County alone over 61,000 cows were milked daily during 1955, producing a record 405,040,000 pounds of quality milk. Another estimated \$4,923,547 was paid to dairy employees. The milk production provided Lancaster dairy farmers with a \$18,145,800 farm cash income, more than any other single farm crop.

During 1955 over 45,000 dairy farmers in Pennsylvania milked an average 940,000 cows for a total milk production in excess of 6,364,000,000 pounds, and valued at \$287,000,000.

Donegal Reunion Features Reports

Metal markers in the cemetery at Donegal Presbyterian church have been replaced with cement, reported the Rev. Harlan C. Durfee, pastor, at the 43rd annual reunion of the Donegal Society at the church last week. Forty-four of the early families are buried in the cemetery. Each year floral tributes are placed on three of the graves.

Another feature of the program was the dedication of memorial trees by the Rev. Mr. Durfee as living memorials to Mrs. William H. Bradley, past member of the executive committee, Clarence Schock, past president of the society, and Miss Virginia Clark, past member of the executive committee.

Principal speaker at the afternoon session was Dr. Paul Swain Havens, president of Wilson College. David C. Witmer, Mount Joy RI chairman of the committee on trees and grounds, reported that the ancient "Witness Tree" is in excellent condition although some of the older ones are showing the scars of "Hurricane Hazel."
