

Donegal Airport News

Reuel H. Walter, flying farmer of Middleburg, Pa., was among the visitors last week. Mr. Walter keeps his Piper Super Cruiser at his small private airport right on the farm, just west of Middleburg. The Walter family has relatives living near Maytown, and are occasional visitors here. They usually make the trip after the day's work is finished, allowing sufficient time for their return trip to make the landing at home by daylight. The round trip takes about an hour, and we noticed Mrs. Walter makes good use of the time taking her needlework with her.

The Pennsylvania Aeronautics Commission's new air map is being distributed to pilots throughout the state, and Barney Murray, inspector for this area has just delivered our supply for local distribution. It is similar to the "Sectional" charts published by the U. S. Coast and Geodetic Survey in scale of approximately eight miles to the inch, in landmarks, natural or manmade, such as rivers, creeks, lakes, cities, railroads, and principal highways. All commercial airports are shown and also listed are the many private or "personal use" airports thru out the state. The reverse side of the map gives a detailed list of the facilities available at each commercially operated airport, such as runway length and type of surface, grade of fuels sold, radio frequencies, if radio controlled, whether or not night lighting is installed, and stating if lunch counter, overnight lodging, telephone, and transportation are available. Use of the state chart enables the pilots to fly anywhere in Pennsylvania using only one map whereas in using the commonly used sectional maps five of these must be used to reach all points in the state. The state map is distributed free to pilots and is a very much appreciated service.

There are quite a few personal use airports right here in the county. Alvin Reist, Mt. Joy, also Lester Wolgemuths, Amos Shenk, Litzitz Kenneth Habecker and Robert Noll, of Lancaster, all being in use for some years.

We have landed on private airports at various times during our travels and have found their owners to be hospitable folk, we have been offered at suitable times; dinner, night lodging, even use of the family car, if such was needed.

George R. Harkins, Forest Hill, Md., and Ronald Light, Bel Air, Md., visited Donegal last week while on a cross-country training flight. Both are student pilots at near by Aldino airport. They were flying Aeronca airplanes, one a "Chief" and the other a "Champion" model.

PENNA. DUTCH DAYS TO BE HELD AT HERSHEY PARK

Hershey, Pa. — Followers of the Pennsylvania Dutch will soon be "shuffling off" to Hershey Park for the 8th annual observance of Pennsylvania's original Dutch festival, Pennsylvania Dutch Days, Thursday 23 thru Sunday, August 26.

While the program's flavor remains heavily spiced with "Dutch" tradition, the celebration has taken on a decided state fair atmosphere. Several new agricultural features have been added, which will give visitors a bird's eye view of Pennsylvania's Farm Show next January.

Highlighting the "Dutch" aspect of the program will be the mammoth crafts exhibits in the Sports Arena, where several hundred artisans will demonstrate such "lost" arts as glass-blowing, ceramics, weaving, and quilting. The quilting section will feature ladies of four area churches and will be backgrounded by a display of some 300 quilts.

In addition to such familiar farm features as the dairy cattle show, market hog show and sale and the farm implement exhibit, James E. Bobb, chairman of the agricultural events, has added two new features, a display by the South Penn Purebred Dairy Goat Association, and a Hay Show. Judging of the dairy show cattle, in which 4-H Club members will vie with their elders for \$4,000 in prize money, and the coronation of the State Lotwaerrick (Apple Butter) Queen will be features of Thursday's program.

An old-fashioned Pennsylvania Dutch auction, which will be conducted partially in the Dutch dialect, will open Friday's program in the bandshell at 3:00 p.m. In the evening, a Dutch religious service, with the Rev. Pierce E. Swope, of Lebanon, conducting the program in Dutch, is scheduled at 7 p.m.

A square dance will follow at 8:15 in the park ballroom. Saturday's program will be highlighted by the Pennsylvania Poultry Federation's program. Opening at 11 a.m. with a state-wide chicken barbecue at the park athletic field, which is expected to attract some 10,000 persons, the program will continue throughout the day.
