Hempfield School Schedule

Landsville-Salunga - The schools in Hempfield Joint School District will open on Tuesday, September 4, with a meeting of teachers at 8:30 a.m., it was announced by Arthur A. Hackman, supervising principal. The following schedule for enrollment and registration of pupils will be in effect: Sept. 4th, teachers meetings; Sept. 5th, all students in grades 9, 10, 11, and 12 only will report to the Hempfield High School, Landsville, and all elementary students will report to their respective schools, for a morning half-day session; Sept. 6, students in grades 7 and 8 only will report to the Hempfield High School, and all elementary students will report to their respective schools for a morning half-day session; Sept. 7, kindergarten students will report for first day of school, and all elementary and high school students will report for full day of regular classes.

School day hours to be observed throughout the year are: Hempfield High School, 8:30 a.m. to 3:33 p.m.; elementary grades, 8:30 to 11:30 a.m., and from 12:25 to 3:25 p.m.; kindergarten, 8:45 to 11:15 a.m. and from 12:45 to 3:15 p.m.

Present enrollment figures of all students in the Hempfield jointure, composed of East and West Hempfield Townships and Mountville boro, indicates an increase of 7 per cent over the last school year. The district has a total enrollment of 2783 students - 1833 in kindergarten through grade six, and 950 in grades 7 through 12.

Mr. Hackman also reports that bus schedules and routes will be the same as for the previous year, and that the school cafeterias in the districts' six buildings will be open on Sept. 7. Pupils in grades 5 and 6 from the Rohrerstown district will be transported to the Landsville elementary schools.

September Peak Month For Fairs
Harrisburg - With the approach of Labor Day and County Fair Season in Pennsylvania takes its second wind and gets underway in earnest.

According to the Department of Commerce, more than 40 county and community fairs will take place in the month of September along with a rural festival or two.

Although most people think of Pennsylvania as an industrial giant with large centers of population, agriculture & husbandry still bulk large in the Commonwealth's economy. The vigor and variety of county fairs attest to that.

Reading, York and Allentown are probably the biggest fairs in terms of attendance but the variety of exhibits is immense at even the smallest Pennsylvania county fair.

One of the most interesting September events in Pennsylvania is the annual Flax Scutching Festival at Stahtstown in southwestern Pennsylvania. Here the old time art of harvesting, breaking, scutching and spinning flax into linen thread is the basis of a variety of contests. Weavers display their art with the versatile fiber in another series of exhibitions.

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Reading Fair Opens Sept. 9

Reading, Pa. - The Reading Fair opens one week from Sunday, and the usual press of eleventh hour details confront fair prexy John S. Giles and his associates.

Of paramount importance this week are closing dates for entries in two important fair contests: the Miss Reading Fair beauty contest that has its entry deadline Saturday, Sept. 1, and a new "Farm Maid Contest" in which entries close Friday August 31.

Another important date on the pre-fair calendar is next Tuesday, Sept. 4. On that day the grandstand reserved seat ticket sale opens at the fair's downtown ticket office, located at 117 S. 5th St. Reading Reserved seat tickets for all performances of the fair will be available here.

The fair, one of Pennsylvania's largest operates Sunday Sept. 9 through 16th, eight days and seven nights.

Some of the finest exhibits of livestock produce and women's handiwork are displayed at the fair, and a staff of trained workers will begin tabulating entries in those departments next Tuesday.

The sale of indoor and outdoor commercial exhibit space is another important chore fair officials must perform. Before the fair office moves to the fairgrounds on Friday, Sept. 7, all exhibit space will be sold at the city office, 522 Court Street, Reading.

Last week, tens of thousands of school children's tickets for the fair were distributed to school superintendents in Reading and Berks County, and the outlying counties of Schuylkill, Lebanon, Lancaster, Chester and Montgomery. Five school children's days are observed at the fair.

DEADLINE FOR SALES TAX RETURN EXTENDED
A blanket 10-day extension for filing July returns of the three per cent sales and use tax was granted all licensees today by Secretary of Revenue Gerald A. Gleeson.

The July collections, ordinarily due August 31, will now be due by midnight, Monday, September 10. Secretary Gleeson said.

The extension was ordered because of a printer's delay in supplying all of the new forms that will be used from now on in filing tax returns. The new simplified forms, featuring a tab card for returns instead of the longer paper forms, were mailed last week to nearly 200,000 licensees.
