YORK FAIR OPENS SEPTEMBER 11
York, Pa. — One of the greatest entertainment programs ever arranged for patrons will feature the annual York Interstate Fair opening next Tuesday, Sept. 11, and will continue all week day and night through Saturday, Sept. 15.

No effort or expense has been spared by General Mgr. S. S. Lewis to secure the customary wealth of outstanding entertainment and exhibits. The displays of livestock, agricultural and farm products, machinery and exhibits of every nature will more than live up to the usual high standards. And as usual there will be keen competition among the 4-H girls and boys for the premiums and special prizes.

Tuesday as usual will be School Children's Day with plenty of exciting band music by the Red Lion High School and West York Joint Area High School bands in the afternoon. The York Wm. Penn Senior High School Band in the evening.

The grandstand vaudeville acts this year contain many outstanding circus and international features. Among them are the Stuart Morgan Dancers, Michael Chimes and his family, direct from Ed Sullivan's TV Show, Willie West and McGinty, hilarious comedy house builders; the famous Alberto Zoppe Bareback Riders; The Bokara Troupe, teeterboard artists; the Four Marconi's comedy quartette, also from the Ed Sullivan TV Show, and Sonny Moore's Roustabouts, a dog and pony act, are just a few of the featured attractions which will be presented daily, afternoon and night.

The nightly revue will be Frank Wirth's glamorous new musical, "High and Mighty" presented with a line of 24 lovely girls, in colorful scenes with electrical effects and new scenery. The gigantic all-weather covered stage insures a complete performance every night, rain or shine.

Following the usual custom special added features have been booked for the grandstand audience. On Wednesday afternoon and night, Olsen and Johnson and "Hellzapoppin Show"; On Thursday afternoon and night, The Vagabonds, the daffiest swing quartette; On Friday, the popular Ted Lewis of battered top hat and clarinet fame with his all-star show. On Saturday afternoon and night the climax of the grandstand attraction will be Irish Horan and his Lucky Hell Drivers, just one chill and thrill after another. An added feature will show a stock car fired from a huge cannon.

There will be a full program of horse racing on the fast, half-mile track. Harness racing on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday afternoons; running races every day including Saturday. The miles of well lighted, paved midways will be occupied by the James Strates Shows and Rides.

The same low admission for reserved grandstand seats will prevail as in previous years. This in spite of the ever rising costs for high class attractions. Grandstand reserved seats are available at \$1.20, \$1.80, and \$2.40, tax included and may be obtained at Fair offices, or by telephone, York 8-2033 and 8-2086.

LARGE AREAS OPEN FOR HUNTING

Harrisburg — Maurice K. Goddard, Secretary, Pennsylvania Department of Forests and Waters, today announced the opening of 48,851 acres of undeveloped land in eleven (11) State Parks for the '56 hunting season. This is an increase of 3,660 acres over last year's acreage.

The locations of these State Parks are: Big Pocono in Monroe County; Blue Knob in Bedford County; Cook Forest in Clarion, Jefferson and Forest Counties; French Creek in Berks and Chester Counties; Hickory Run in Carbon County; Laurel Hill in Somerset County; Raccoon in Beaver County; Ricketts Glen in Sullivan and Luzerne Counties; Tobyhanna in Monroe County; Chapman Dam in Warren County; and Shawnee in Bedford Co.

The different areas will be posted with signs to clearly indicate where hunting is permissible, and individual State Park maps showing permissible hunting areas may be secured at the park offices or by writing to the Department of Forests and Waters, Division of Recreation, Harrisburg, Pa.

Secretary Goddard cautioned the hunters "to use extreme care with firearms and archery equipment since these are public park areas." He also advised caution re-permissible except in park guarding fires, which are not irreplaceable.

GREINA SEASON CLOSES SEPT. 12

Heading the production staff of Gretna Playhouse's final production of the season, the farce-comedy, "Three on a Honeymoon," will be three men who have a combined 14 years of experience at the Mt. Gretna summer theatre. The show, produced by Charles F. Coghlan and Gene P. Otto, opens Thursday.

Stage manager Jack Gilchrist has held his post at Gretna since 1950. He has headed the staff for 92 of the Playhouse's 144 productions. Gilchrist has had extensive theatrical experience in England and the United States as playwright, actor and stage manager.

George Curley, assistant stage manager, has been at Gretna for four seasons. He has worked with summer theatres, music circuses, children's theatre, radio and films. Robert DeMora has designed settings for the playhouses for three years. He attended the Whitney School of Art, New Haven, Conn., and has won an art scholarship to Cooper Institute in New York for the fall.

Louis Marini and Margaret Lewitin are completing their first summer at Mt. Gretna. Marini is technician, while Miss Lewitin is in charge of prompting and sound.

Heading the cast of "Three on a Honeymoon" are Jackson Young, wealthy playboy; Margaret Croyden, his first wife, and Teresa DuHaime, his second wife. Others in the cast are John Main, Gene Galvin, George Curley, Louis Marini, Sandra English and Margot Lewitin. The farce directed by Charles F. Coghlan, will run through Sept. 12.

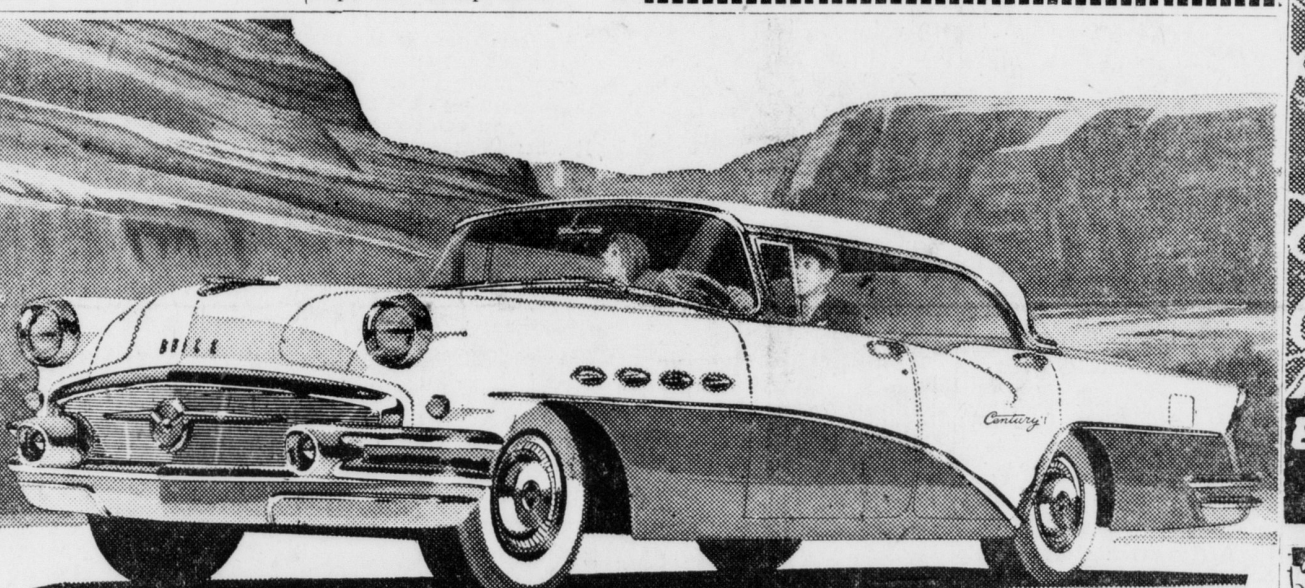
