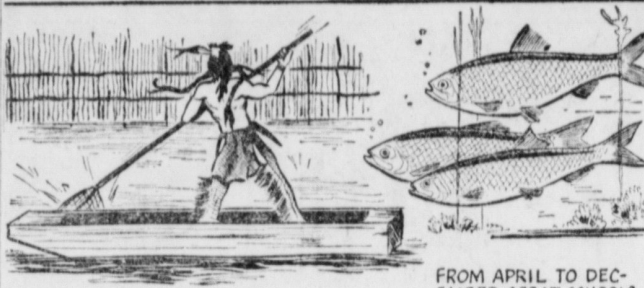

FIREMEN PUT OUT AUTO BLAZE

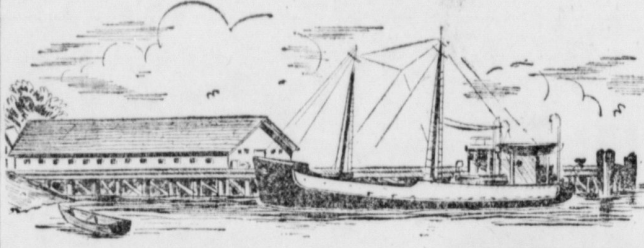

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Delegates From Pennsylvania Fire Police Association To Be Represented At State Convention

The 14 fire companies of the city are planning to send delegates to the state firemen's convention in Scranton, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, October 4, 5 and 6. The Junior Fire Company uniform rank will probably participate in the parade on the final day of the convention. One or two other companies are considering sending their uniformed ranks.

A number of Berks County fire companies will also be represented by delegates.

Formerly the state convention was held on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday with the parade scheduled for the final day—Thursday—but this year it was decided to hold the sessions on Thursday, Friday and Saturday with the parade on Saturday. By having the weekend parade the firemen believe that a greater number of fire companies and bands will be included to participate.

Donegal High School To Offer Evening Classes

Extension education classes for adults and out-of-school youths will again be offered by the Donegal Area Joint Schools. This marks the third year that these classes have been offered in the high school.

In previous years classes in the following have been taught: typewriting I and II, shorthand I and II, Spanish I, bookkeeping, sewing, wood shop, first aid, driver education and art. Any subject taught in day school will be offered in evening school if there is an enrollment of 15 or more. An average attendance of at least 10 must be maintained to keep the class in operation.

Registration for the fall semester will be held in the high school library Oct. 8th from 7 to 9 p.m. Classes will be held Mondays and Thursdays from 7 to 9 beginning Thursday, Oct. 18. Each class will be two hours in length for one evening. The same class will not meet both Monday and Thursday.

PP&L Asks Rate Reduction Order Reversal

Chas. E. Oakes, P. P. & L. president, announced today that the company has appealed to the Superior Court to reverse the recent rate order of the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission reducing rates by \$1.4 million annually and ordering \$1.9 million refund. With the appeal the company also filed a request for a stay of the rate reduction and refunds pending final decision by the Court on validity of the Commission's order.

The utility president said that the request for a stay was to protect the utility from double jeopardy in the event the Commission's order should not be upheld. It was pointed out that the utility would suffer irreparable damage in the event refunds were paid and reduced rates made effective as it was ultimately decided that neither the rate reductions or refunds were proper.

Earnings accruing to the common stock of Pennsylvania Power & Light Company for the 12 months ended July 31, 1956 were \$20,204,214, equivalent to \$3.41 per share of common stock outstanding at such date, as compared with \$18,031,712 or \$3.05 per share for the twelve months ended July 31, 1955. Earnings for both periods include earnings of former subsidiary The Scranton Electric Company, (merged January 31, 1956) for applicable periods prior to merger and earnings for 1955 also include restated earnings of the former Pennsylvania Water & Power Company (merged June 1, 1955). Revenues for the 12 months ended July 31, 1956 on the same basis were \$127,992,441, an increase of 8.1% over comparable revenues for the previous year.

If effect is given to the order of the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission dated July 16, 1956, which directs the Company to reduce rates by approximately \$1.4 million annually based on conditions for the twelve months ended February 28, 1955 and which the Company has appealed to the courts, it is estimated that earnings per share would be \$3.30 for the twelve months ended July 31, 1956 and \$3.02 for the twelve months ended July 31, 1955.

Books Are The Answer To The Way For A Better Job

Elgin, (Ill.) Courier-News—The desire to do a better job and to get a better job is deep seated in the hearts and minds of most Americans. It is the motivating power of progress and freedom. It doesn't matter whether one wants to be a better workman, farmer, lawyer, parent, legislator, housewife—or the builder of a better mouse trap—wanting to do a better job and being able to find out how always has made and is now making history.

"Finding out how" is finding the tools to help you, and many people still don't realize that all of the basic tools are ideas—ideas to be found mostly in books. In earlier days realization was much closer, because books were harder to get, and as a result considered more precious items than they are today. Realizing the importance of books, people set out to get them for themselves, and for others. Benjamin Franklin, for instance, whose 250th birthday anniversary we celebrated this year, organized his fellow tradesmen in Philadelphia into mutual improvement societies—and they acquired collections of books as basic tools for that improvement.

Andrew Carnegie, in the 20th century, felt so indebted to books in his own life that he determined to provide them for others, and gave funds for building local libraries, all over this country.
