The profession of forestry has grown steadily for the past 50 years, they tell me, till 1950. That year our forestry schools graduated 2321 young foresters - but by last year the number had dropped to 829! That means about 1300 forestry jobs in both government and industry will go unfilled this year, 'cause there are no trained fellers to fill them!

I reckon we're going to have to tell our young folks about the rewards of going into this important field - joining the 16,000 trained foresters who are now working in our forestlands. Who can ever forget a first visit to a Mount Hood National Forest, a Clatsop Tree Farm, a Phillips, Brooks Forest, or a Gaylord Plantation? One forester says, "Trees at work for a variety of purposes - wood, water, game, fish, recreation and domestic stock. The forester who looks out over his forest under multiple uses is serene in the knowledge that he's servin' all mankind, now and forever." Mighty fine profession, and it deserves the best we can give it!

Like most tree farmers, I do a lot of bucking. That's when you cut a log into sections of a desired length. 'Course, when you're buckin', it's always best to stand uphill from logs you've already bucked - so they won't fall down on you! And you always want to give plenty of warning to other fellers in the vicinity of a log that may have a tendency to roll after bucking! For this work, you need a saw whose bar is at least half the diameter of the logs you're cuttin'.

"Yep," Ollie Haverill was tellin' me, my father was a great politician in his day!"

"The border!" Haverill replied.

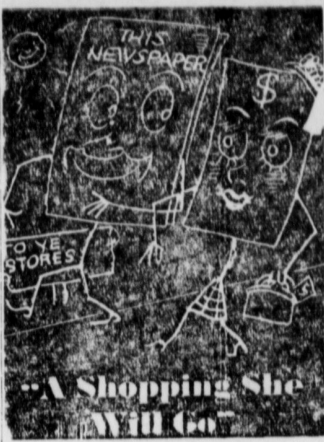

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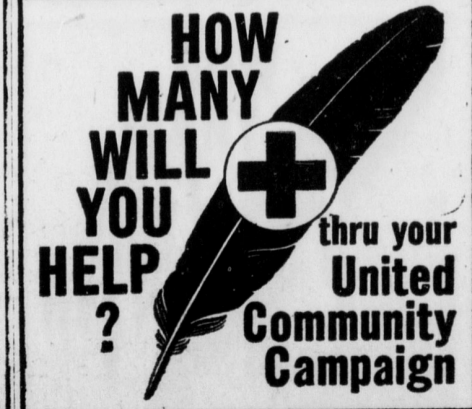
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
