125 Fire Police Serve Over 48 Hours Directing Traffic At Manheim Disaster

Over 200 firefighters and Fire Police from 18 Fire Companies of Lancaster city and county fought a \$100,000 fire at Manheim on September 22nd and 23rd. It took the combines efforts of over 125 Fire Police to keep the traffic moving through the borough streets.

Three mobile Radio (Ham) Units assisted in the Fire Police in the control of the traffic with headquarters set up at the scene of the fire with a monitor station under the direction of Elmer Shaffer, captain of the Manheim Fire Police, assisted by Marvin Foltz, Lancaster County Fire Police Commissioner.

Thirty Firemen were treated for smoke inhalation and minor injuries at a field hospital set up at the scene of the fire and under the direction of Dr. Harry S. Berberian, Medical Director of the Pennsylvania Fire Police. Thanks Rescue Crews Dr. Berberian said he wanted to express his sincere thanks to the doctors, nurses, first-aid workers and ambulance crews for their wholehearted and unselfish cooperation at the fire.

Shortage Of Scientists And Engineers

We definitely are losing the cold war with Russia on one front—the Soviet is turning out scientists and engineers at a much faster pace than the U. S. A.

In May, Harlow H. Currier, General Motors president, at the dedication of that company's new Technical Center, sounded this warning: "Today we are being put to a competitive test, a struggle for survival. We are being challenged in this one area of technological progress that we have come to regard as the source of our greatest strength. We must see to it that a larger proportion of our young people have the opportunity and the incentive for embarking on a scientific or engineering career."

Dr. Lawrence R. Hafstad, director of General Motors research staff, emphasized the warning of his Chief as follows: "Our choice is brutally clear. As a society, we can either learn mathematics and science—or Russian."

American business enterprise has proven the value of research—industries appliances have made the greatest progress and have paid the highest wages. But, today the proportion of American students taking courses in science is smaller than ever. Provisions must be made on an extensive scale to encourage our young people to study science. To repeat the warning of Dr. Hafstad: "We can either learn mathematics and science—or Russian."

"Man is as ready as he is brave," says Gerald Heard. That statement, I think, bears a lot of thought. Man is as ready—for whatever God has in store for him—as he is brave. Let us reflect deeply upon that.

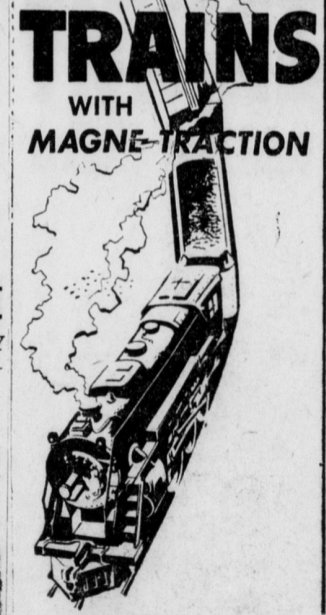

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Bechtelsville Fire Company Purchase New Mack Truck

A new Mack truck has been added to the mobile equipment of Bechtelsville Fire Company.

The truck, capable of pumping 750 gallons of water a minute, was delivered on Monday evening.

The truck and its equipment will cost approximately \$20,000, according to John Kehl, fire chief.

Mr. Kehl said the truck presently is carrying 1,000 feet of 2 1/2 inch hose; 400 ft. of 1 1/2 inch hose and 2 reels of 200 feet 1-inch booster hose.

He said firemen expected to add an electric generator and auxiliary pump to the truck.

Bechtelsville also has a Seagrave pumper.
