Dedication Services Sunday

The First Church of God, Landisville, will dedicate its new education building Sunday, Nov. 18. Special services will be arranged for the day. At 9:15 a. m. Church will also serve as a lounge. School will convene and meet 10:00 a. m. there will be a combined service. At this time the dedication will take place with the Rev. M. C. Manning, president of the East Pennsylvania Conference Board of Appointment, as the speaker. Mr. Cleon Kahler, chairman of the building committee, will cut the ribbon opening the new building. The newly gowned children's choir will sing several numbers.

A short service will be held at 2:30 p.m. in the afternoon when greetings will be brought by conference officials and former pastors. This service will be followed by open house. In the evening a youth rally will be held at 7:30 p.m. at which time the youth of the church will be in charge. The pastor, Thomas Tillett, will speak at this service on the subject, "What do you know?" Miss Frances Nissley of Lititz will play several selections on the harp.

The new building being dedicated represents planning and thinking which goes back to 1948 when the renovation program for the Church was started with the installation of a new heating system and minor alterations to the building.

The architects, Coleman and Coleman, were engaged in October, 1955, and design of the new building proceeded through numerous building committee meetings and approval of the project at a congregation meeting on January 22, 1956. 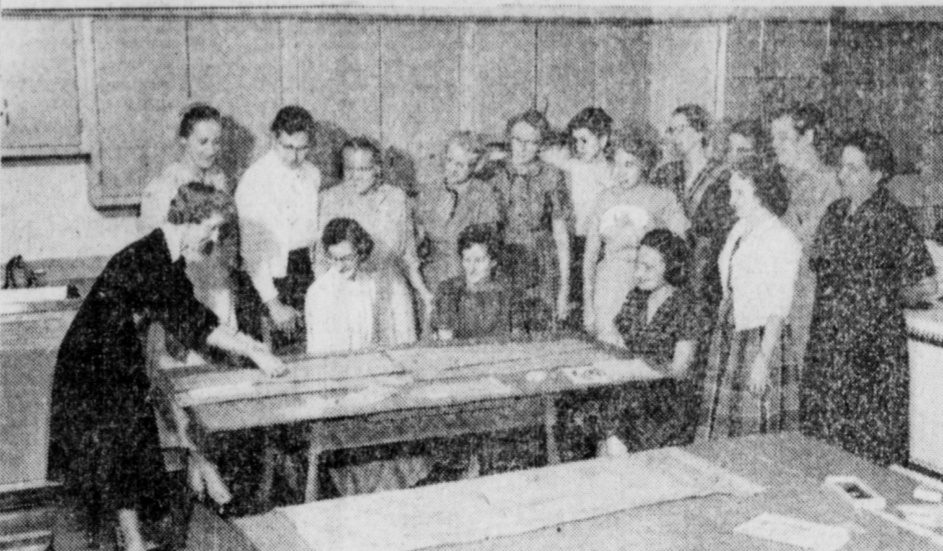
