STUDENTS ATTEND TEA IN LANCASTER

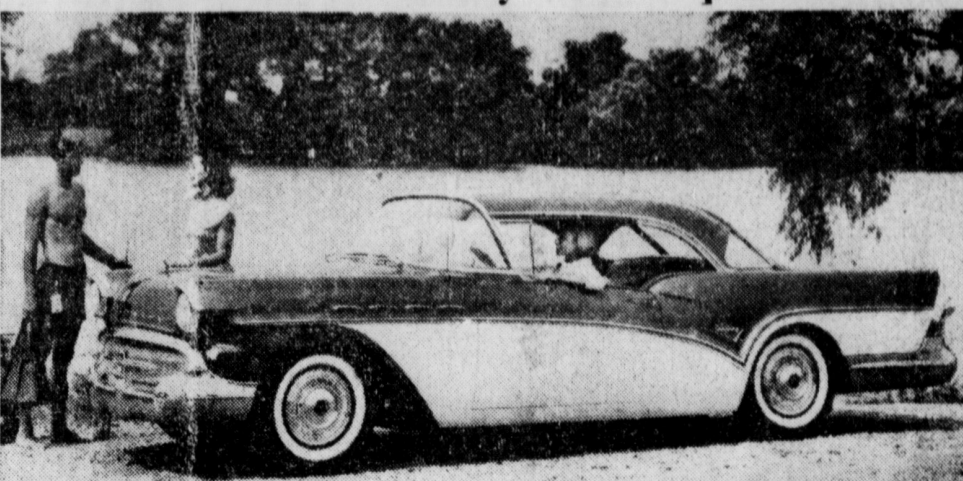

Largest Christmas Club In History

"Peace and Prosperity Pay Off" said Edward F. Dorset, president of Christmas Club a Corporation, who has announced that 12,800,000 Americans had saved one billion, one hundred and eighty-seven million dollars in the 1956 Christmas Club. This record breaking sum was accumulated in some 6,800 banks and saving institutions throughout the nation.

"The huge Christmas Club this year is a natural result of the high degree of employment and the over-all prosperity of our people. While a part of the funds will be spent for Christmas and bring joy to the hearts of our merchants, nearly a third will be put right back in permanent savings. Americans are still thrifty" said Mr. Dorset.

The 1956 payoff is the largest in the history of the Club and represents an increase over 1955 of 57 million dollars (5%) with three hundred thousand more members. The average check this year amounts to \$92.73 for each member.

Of the 6,800 institutions 148 had clubs in excess of \$1,000,000 each. As in past years, New York leads with 2,615,833 members and \$252,107,041, followed by Pennsylvania with 2,001,623 members and \$181,539,855 and then New Jersey with 1,144,106 members and \$137,989,946. With the rapid growth of the Club on the Pacific Coast, California reached fourth place with 936,423 members and \$101,128,002.

Important Rules To Follow In Taking Medicine

Never take medicine in the dark.

Always read the directions carefully before taking a dose of medicine.

Never increase the dose or take it more frequently than directed without asking your physician.

Pour from the bottle with the label upward. This keeps the label clean and easy to read.

Shake liquid medicines, if so directed.

Never take medicines originally prescribed and intended for others.

Keep medicine out of the reach of children.

Close container at once. Some medicines get stronger,

others weaker, if container is left open. Never interchange tops or covers on pill or powder boxes if they bear directions regarding use. Dangerous results may occur.

Never pour medicine back into the bottle as it may contaminate the preparation.
