Pennsylvania Opens Additional Lands For State Parks

Harrisburg. — Maurice K. Goodard, Secretary, Pennsylvania Department of Forests and Waters, today announced the opening of 48,851 acres of undeveloped land in 11 State Parks for the 1956 hunting season.

This is an increase of 3660 acres over last year's acreage.

The locations of these State Parks are: Big Pocono in Monroe County; Blue Knob in Bedford County; Cook Forest in Clarion, Jefferson and Forest Counties; French Creek in Berks and Chester Counties; Hickory Run in Carbon County; Laurel Hill in Somerset County; Raccoon in Beaver County; Ricketts Glenn in Sullivan and Luzerne Counties; Tobyhanna in Monroe County; Chapman Dam in Warren County; and Shawnee in Bedford County.

The different areas will be posted with signs to clearly indicate where hunting is permissible.

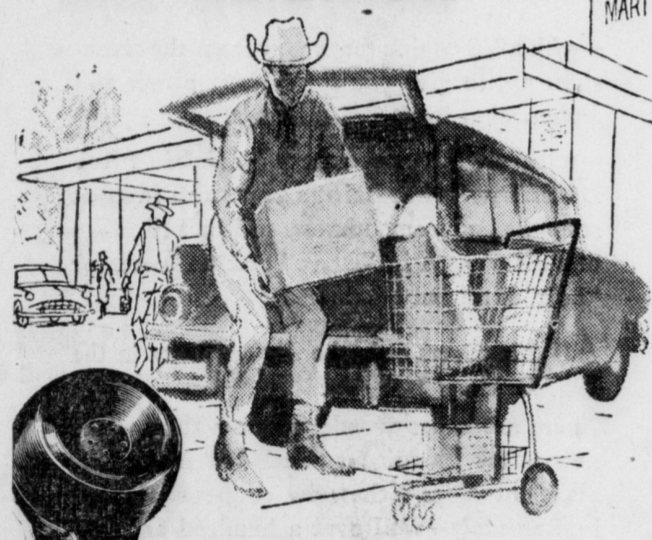

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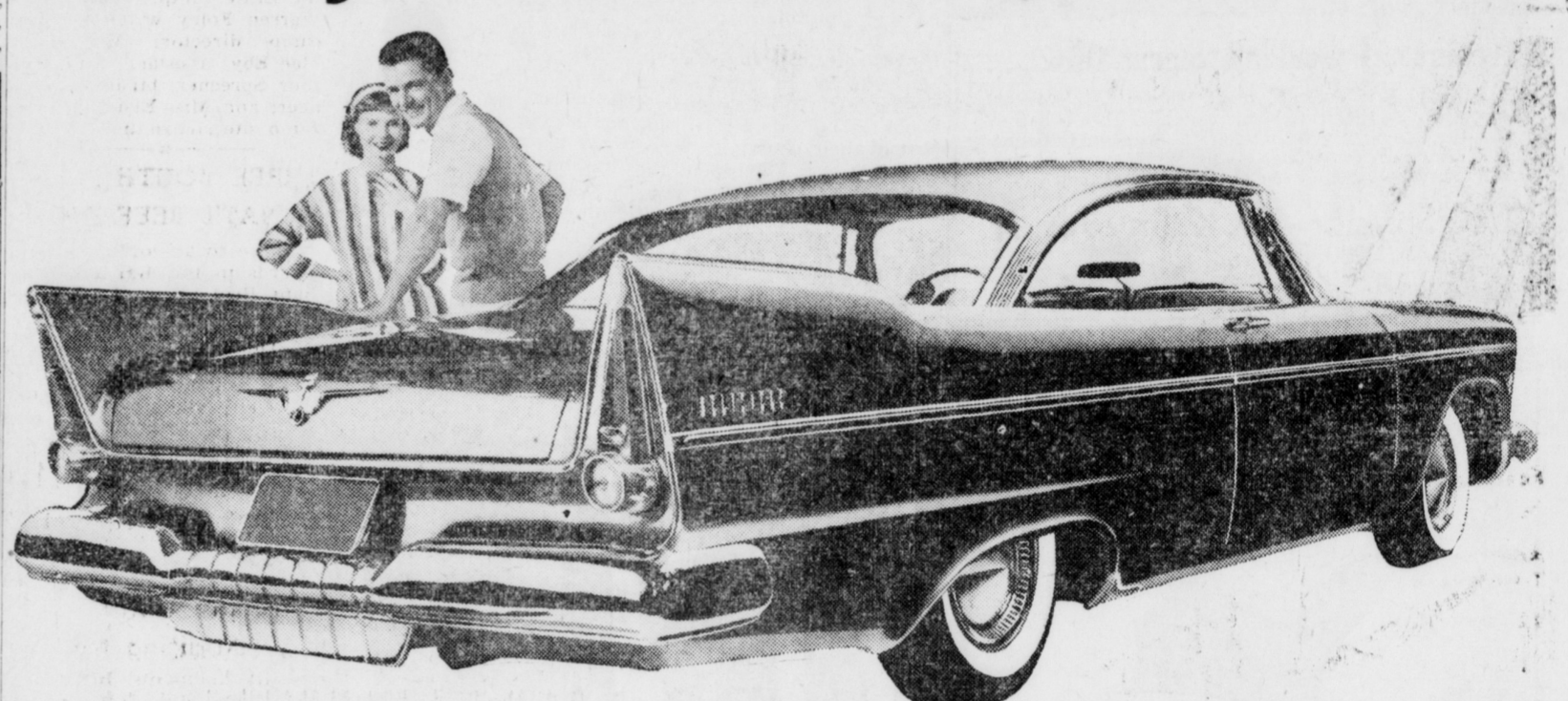

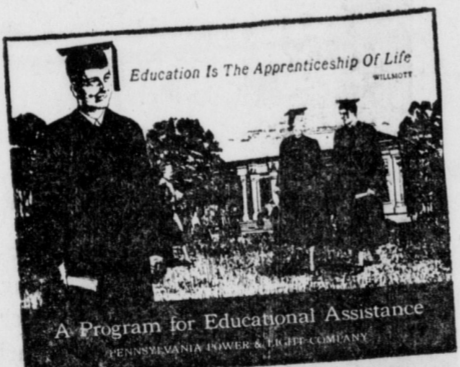
AFTER HIGH SCHOOL—COLLEGE?
