A total of 12 agricultural scholarships—three in each of the undergraduate classes—are awarded each year by PP&L to students enrolled in the university's college of agriculture who are residents of the utility's service area. The PP&L awards are made on the basis of character, scholarship and promise of usefulness in the field of agriculture. Each scholarship winner receives \$200 toward his year's tuition costs.

Mr. Oakes pointed out that the PP&L agricultural scholarship program is built around a recognition of the importance of agriculture to the economy of the state. These scholarships also are offered, he added, with the knowledge that the continued sound development of the area agricultural potential will be greatly enhanced with the advancement of knowledge in all of agriculture's related fields.

Since the program was instituted, 21 recipients of P. P. & L. agricultural scholarships have been graduated from the university.

Heinly is majoring in general agriculture at Penn State. He is a 1954 graduate of Lancaster high school.

Muscular Dystrophy Drive Underway

More than 200,000 people in the United States suffer from muscular dystrophy and at least 50 percent are children between 3 and 13. Of these, few will reach their teens and all will die before reaching maturity. The childhood form of MD is the most prevalent type and a second form which starts in adolescence progresses more slowly and the patients may live through middle age. A third form which commences in early adulthood affects the facial muscles, shoulders and upper arms.

Muscular dystrophy is not contagious but some forms are hereditary. The cause of this tragic ailment is unknown. Two years ago, six mothers of doomed children met in New York to start a formal fight against the ailment. Through their efforts, the Muscular Dystrophy Association of America, Inc. was founded. Funds raised through this fund are used to support scientific projects to discover a cure.
