Postmaster Zerphey, who has launched his 1956 "Mail Early for Christmas" Campaign, believes a word or two to the wise will help make your Christmas and those of your friends and loved ones as merry as it should be.

With Christmas only a little more than a month away, the Post Office is geared up right now to insure the delivery of all gift packages and Christmas Cards by December 25th, but cooperation is essential. Speaking about his plans, the Postmaster said, "There's about 167 million people in this country today. More than ever before. More people means more Christmas mail. That's why it's so important to have a helping hand from the public to 'Mail Early For Christmas'." The Postmaster especially directed his appeal to "the lady of the house", because she usually selects the Christmas cards, buys most of the gifts, and sees to it that the Christmas mailing list is up-to-date.
