**OUT ON A LIMB**

My old friend Allen Reiner, in Long Island City, N.Y., likes to tell about the autumn he spent in Texas. When he got home, he drove up in a brand-new Cadillac and started unloading mink coats, diamond rings and bags of money.

"For heaven's sakes, Allen," his wife said, "where did you get that car and those mink coats, diamond rings and bags of money?"

"Relax, honey," Allen said. "I spent Halloween in Fort Worth, where all them millionaire oilmen live, and we decided to go playin' trick or treat!"

"Ol' Sam was askin' me question about loggin' his wood lot the other day. If you own a wood lot or a small forest, and have never logged it, maybe you'd like to know the answers, too. I told Sam I know of four ways for loggin' a wood lot.

One is clear cuttin', where you cut down every tree in sight. That's bad unless you're planning to use the land for another kind of crop. Two is seed-tree cuttin', where you leave only 10 or 12 trees standing for reseedin' purposes. That's bad, too—cause a lot of time is wasted for reseedin' that ought to be devoted to growin'.

Three is diameter-limit cuttin', where you cut trees over a certain diameter, say ten inches. Trouble with that is, you may leave lots of unhealthy or deformed trees, and cut others that are in their growing prime. Four is selective cuttin'—and that's the best kind of logging I know of. You may need the help of a forester, at least the first time. But you'll be sure every tree has the best chance to grow right, and you'll be cuttin' every tree at its highest value.
