Service Forester
Is Named

The Pennsylvania Depart-
ment of Forests and Waters
through its S. E. District
Office at Port Kennedy has
announced the appointment
of John H. Kitch as resident
Service Forester in Lancast-
er county.

Kitch was born and raised
in this county near Lancast-
er, was graduated from W.
Earl high school in Brown-
town.

Kitch is now residing
near Reinhold, in northern
Lancaster County.

The job of Service Forester
in this county, entails
helping farmers and other
woodland owners to prop-
erly manage their timber. This
is carried out in two ways;
by educational talks and
in-the-woods training ses-
sions of farm groups such as
the Grange and young peo-
ple's classes and secondly by
actually measuring, evaluat-
ing and marking trees for
harvest and stand improve-
ment.

If any woodland owner
desires this valuable, free
service he should direct a
letter of request to the Dis-
trict Forester, Pennsylvania
Department of Forests and
Waters, Montgomery county,
Penna. Nearly 19 per cent
of Lancaster County is most
suitable for growing timber,
according to Forest Service
statistics. The Service Fore-
ster provides an excellent
opportunity for the wood-
land owner to get profes-
sional advice on making the
most of his timber which
means greater production
and money in the owner's
pocket.

Of Prayer

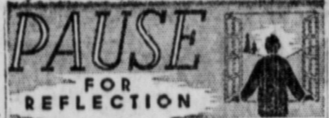
Plans were being complet-

Swiss mountaineers recent-
ly reported they had climbed
Mount Everest, the world's
highest mountain, for the
second and third times that
it has been climbed. They
also said they had made the
first ascent of Everest's twin
peak, Lhotse, according to a
Reuters dispatch from Kat-
mandu, Nepal.

Among the world's phys-
ical mountains there remain
few challenges to man's dar-
ing and fortitude. But in the

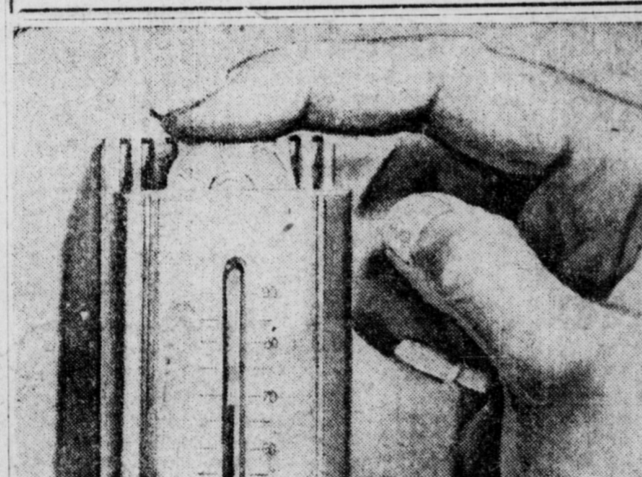
