Tuesday meeting. A report by Secretary Bailey, who also conducted the election of officers, showed that the Christmas Lighting committee received \$670 in donations this season and spent \$619.12, leaving a balance in its fund of \$332.23.

In tracing school growth in this community, Mr. Beahm pointed out that the "old grade school" was built in 1872 for \$15,000 at what was called then a "high cost". In 1926 the high school was built "out in the country" for \$66,000. The addition in 1936 cost \$73,000. Each of the programs in its day was regarded as high priced.

The speaker held out no indications that education ever is a cheap process. He took on the other hand, the viewpoint that the ever increasing "school problem" is one of good indication. Rather than lament, he rejoiced that America has an opportunity to give to an increasing population the benefits of ever better education.

In viewing the school population situation locally, he pointed out that the high school, including the six upper grades, on December 1 included 833 boys and girls. At the same time, the second, third and fourth grades alone totaled 708 youngsters.

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## Wins First Place In Corn Contest

Kenneth Young, Mt. Joy R1, will be given the first prize winning ribbon for having the largest yield per acre of corn in the county last year.

In a report issued by the Pennsylvania Crop Improvement group, a first and a second place winner were named from each county of the state. The local junior at Donegal high school had a yield of 258 bushels of corn per acre to be named top student in Lancaster County. Kenneth gained fame last year with his prize winning heifers which took local, county, state and national prizes.

### SEAMS IMPORTANT TO GOOD GARMENT FIT

For good blouse and bodice fit, when making your own clothes, stand in front of the mirror and look at yourself full-front, suggests Bernice J. Tharp, extension clothing specialist of the Pennsylvania State University.

Watch for these points: Your shoulder lines should be on the grain of fabric (threads should lie at right angles to each other at four inches below center of normal neckline curve.) The seams at the shoulder should point from the tip of the ear toward the tip of shoulder bone at armhole seam.
