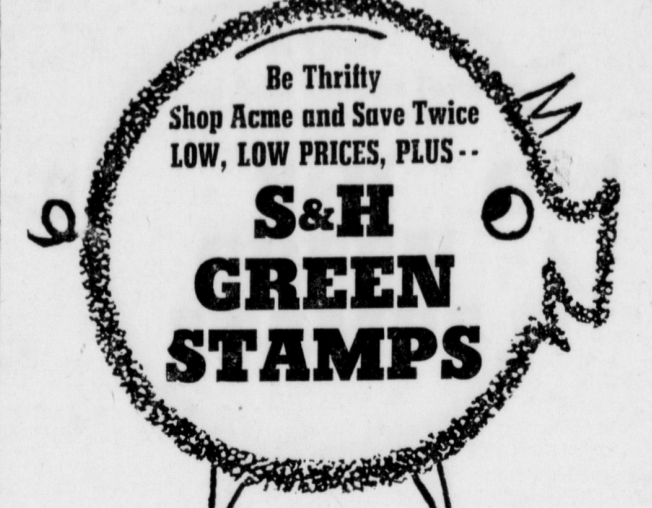
### VISIT FARM SHOW

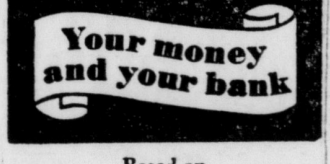

They advise as to the most suitable type of bond for the customer to buy, the most convenient denomination and the various rates of interest paid.

After a customer has decided on his own bond program, the bank will handle the purchasing of the bonds and deliver them to him. Arrangements may be made for a regular purchasing program, if desired. If the bonds are interest-bearing, your bank will arrange for the redemption of the coupons.

When the bonds mature, the bank will also handle the redemption of the principal. No charges are made for any of these services.

A safe deposit box is an excellent place to keep your bonds, and most banks offer them for rent. The great majority of U. S. savings bonds issued by the Government are purchased through the country's banks.
