

## Mt. Joy's Old Landmarks

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I, as a person interested in Mt. Joy who was born here and lived here, am interested in some of the old buildings, which have a lot of history.

There is a move on, in Lancaster, to try to preserve some of the old landmarks.

One of Mt. Joy's landmarks has already been torn down—the old grade school building, which was built in 1872.

Another landmark—the old Pennsylvania railroad station on Market St.—I've heard is also scheduled to be torn down. This building was built around 1876 and used as a station for the railroad until 1896, when the "cut" was dug through Mt. Joy.

Another landmark is the old DeLong building, built in 1871. This was a storage building. From here William DeLong shipped eggs to New York. He had several horse teams out buying eggs from the farmers. He had his office on Main St., where the First National Bank is located today. This information was received by me from an old resident of the Borough. The future of this building is also a question mark as it is now for sale.

I think it would be nice if there was some way, some of these buildings could be saved. I asked someone about it when the school building was torn down and they said "Where would the money come from to preserve the old buildings. Maybe the owners could find some way, if the townspeople would be interested in preserving some of their old landmarks."

I have prepared this article, with the idea that some people might be interested in trying to help. It should give the people something to think about. If I have accomplished that very thing, I will feel I am trying to help.

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## Landisville - Salunga

An estimated 875 children of school and pre-school age received Salk anti-polio vaccinations last week during a two day inoculation period in the Hempfield School District. Mrs. Isabelle Royce, school nurse for the school district, reported that 275 children of pre-school age received the injections at the elementary schools in East Petersburg, Mountville, Rohrerstown and Farmdale last Wednesday.

On Thursday, another 600 students at the Hempfield High School and the Landisville Elementary School received the vaccine, the school nurse stated. Last week's inoculations were the second in a series administered to the Hempfield Schools and other schools throughout the county. The first were given last December, with the third and final shots scheduled for late spring prior to the closing of school for the summer months.

The congregation of the Zion Lutheran Church, Landisville, during annual congregational meeting, voted an approval for plans to sponsor a Hungarian refugee or refugee family. Initial action for the project was taken by the Couples Club, a social organization at the church, last week, and their recommendation was unanimously approved by the congregation. The Couples Club will take on the project with assistance from the congregation. A committee of three couples was set up to study the

housing situation, job opportunities and costs involved for sponsoring a refugee family or individual in the community. Members of this group are Mr. and Mrs. William Newell, Mr. and Mrs. Douglas Williams and Mr. Mrs. Earl Meisenhelter.

In other business at the church meeting, four new church council members were elected for a two-year term of office. They include Mrs. Arthur Hackman, Mr. Dean Lowry, Mr. Chas. Eby and Mr. Fred Kaser. The budget for the year 1957 was accepted as recommended.

The Hempfield Sertoma Club will sponsor a magic program at the Hempfield High School, Landisville, Friday January 25 at 8:00 p. m. "Ridely the Magician" and his troupe will headline the program sponsored by the Landisville area service club, and is open to the public.

Emory L. Krick, president of the SRRVCE TO MANKIND organization, has announced that one-third of the proceeds from the program will be donated to the Clarence Wieder Fund at the First National Bank at Landisville. Clarence Wieder, 10, a student at the East Petersburg Elementary School, was struck by a state police car last September while waiting for a school bus on route No. 230. The injury to the youth necessitated the amputation of his left leg below the knee.

Krick also announced that the Key Club, a boys' service club at the Hempfield High School, is assisting in the sale of tickets to the program.
