OUT ON A LIMB

It was no secret to my neighbor Gulliver that his second-hand tractor was a heavy gas-eater. But the other day he pulled into a fillin' station and left the motor running while the feller filled the tank, and after about ten minutes the feller said, "Would you mind shuttin' the motor off, buddy? You're gettin' ahead of me!"
Conservation is important in farming, too, and nobody knows that better than the boys and girls who belong to 4-H clubs. That reminds me: We're mighty proud of Don Hammerquist, a 16-year-old from Claitlam Bay, Washington, who represented his state in the nation-wide 4-H forestry award contest. And we're just as proud of every other boy in this work whom Don represents. He was picked for his skillful management of a farm wood lot, from which he harvested and sold spruce pulpwood from "thinings. Good work, Don!"
Out in California, more than 45,000 acres of timber land were placed under the tree farm program last year—bringing the state's total to some 1,856,000 acres of privately-owned land that are devoted to growing timber as a crop. And that means—in the nation as a whole—that tree farms have spread to 7534 separate tree farms and 38 million acres in 40 states!
I like to hear about farmers' aims' all them trees, 'cause trees have played such a big part in our history. They saved the colony at Jamestown, y'know. Ever hear the story?
One mornin' Captain John Smith received an angry letter from the London bankers who had financed the Jamestown colony. Bankers said that, since the colonists hadn't sent any gold or silver back to England, the bankers would abandon the colony if the next ship to England didn't bring back enough products to pay the company's expenses of about \$8000. Well, sir, John Smith knew there wasn't no chance of findin' gold or silver thereabouts, but he knew the English badly needed "naval stores"—tar, pitch, turpentine and resin—which could be made from the pine trees that grew around the colony.
So he put his people to work—tappin' pines for turpentine, cuttin' trees for clapboards and wainscoting, burnin' wood to make soap-ashes, and collectin' frankincense from the trunks of the loblolly pine. When the ship returned to England, it carried a cargo of manufactured forest products—the first from America. From then on, the Virginia colonists sent quantities of naval stores. And in May, 1620—the same year the Mayflower set sail for the New World—the bankers held a meetin' in London, and decided to continue to support Jamestown as a sound business venture. Virginia's forestlands had saved the colony!
