Navy Recruit Officer Here On Tuesdays

Chief Lloyd J. Stevens, petty officer in charge of the Lancaster Navy Recruiting Office has announced that ex-Navy men are eligible for immediate high-cash bonuses. This is the result of the large number of men reenlisting in the Navy.

Not only has the Navy Department authorized the payment of advance travel pay to the station (in private car or otherwise), but is now affording the Navy man who desires to continue a Naval career his choice of the Atlantic or Pacific coast with 30 days advance leave.


The serviceman's family has increased financial protection in that allowances are advanced for men with dependents. The outstanding program allows servicemen in 62 ratings to return with the rate held at time of discharge—even though two years have elapsed.
