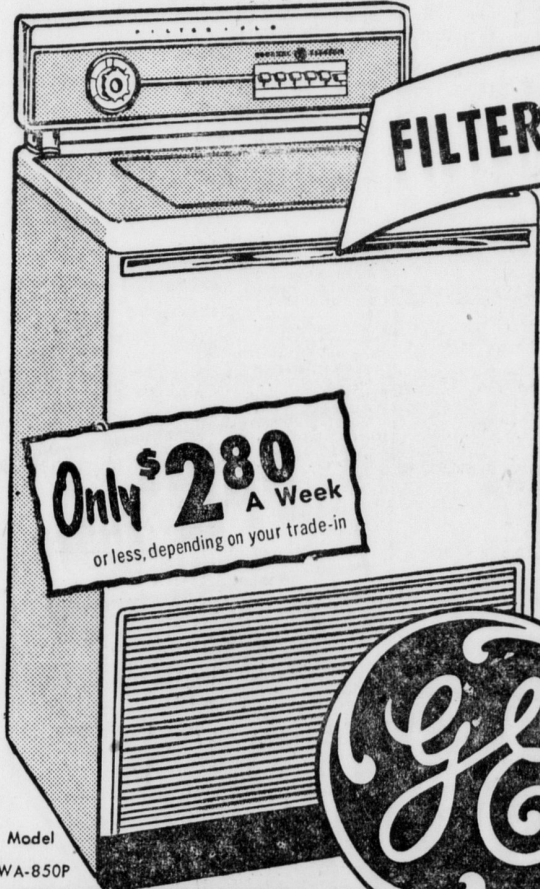

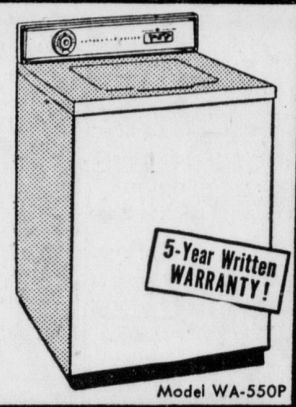

## Donegal Indians To Battle Columbia In Final Home Game Of Season

Donegal high school's unpredictable Indians ring down the curtain on the '57 home basketball season Friday night.

As the 18th game of the season, they will meet Columbia in a pair of games—varsity and junior varsity.

The "unpredictable" Indians last week rammed home a nice victory by clipping the Manheim Central Barons in the third period as Buch-2-58 in an overtime struggle.

Big Jerry Buchenauer slapped in 23 points to show the way all evening. It was his two-point dunker which pulled Donegal into a 58-58 tie for the overtime.

Then, he hit again as did Barry Trostle to send the count to 62.

Donegal, trailing 29-20 at halftime, caught the Barons in the third period as Buchenauer scored nine points,

Joe Hostetter got six and Denny Gillham four. Buchenauer, who got a fielder and 7 fouls in the third, hung up nine more points in the last period to lead the tying surge.

In the preliminary, the Manheim Central J.V.'s won, 43-37.

Tuesday night's game at Penn Manor, however, was a different story. Penn won 63 to 52.

## Need Leaders For Girl Scouts

Girl Scout leaders are needed in the local Mount Joy-Florin Neighborhood. At the present time, one leader and two assistant leaders are needed for Intermediate troops which meet in the evenings.

At the present time there are fifty-six million women in the United States over the age of 18. From this total, Girl Scout leaders must be chosen. In a recent survey, figures showed that mothers with children aged 6 to 11 only total 38% of the labor force; 41% of mothers with children aged 12 to 17 only.

The proportion of children has doubled within the last few years and the need for leaders has doubled. Keeping the "working" figures in mind, the field for leaders has both lowered and raised. Leaders will have to be chosen from the younger and older women of the Community.

Mrs. James Roberts is in charge of troop organizing. Any interested women are asked to contact Mrs. Roberts whether she is 18 or 60, whether or not she is employed outside the home, or whether or not she is a mother of young girls.

## Holsteins Make Test Records

A special report of the Holstein-Friesian Association of America, Brattleboro, Vt., announces the completion of official production records by several Holstein cows in the herds of farmers in this area.

Pennsylvania State University supervised the weighing and testing of these records, which compare with an annual production of only 5,815 lbs. of milk and 224 lbs. of butterfat by the average S. cow.

The new records are a part of the national Holstein organization's Herd Improvement Registry—a popular official testing program designed to provide individual production and lifetime production records on every cow participating herds.

Among the cows included are:

Clovena Lucifer Rosita, owned by Henry Hess, Mount Joy, milked twice daily for 265 days produced 15,641 pounds of milk and 653 lbs. of butterfat as a 4-year-old.

Walker Lucifer Flossie, owned by Albert R. Fry, of Manheim, milked twice daily for 322 days, producing 14,537 lbs. milk and 608 lbs. butterfat as an 8-year-old.
