Army Band Enlistment Open

A revision of Army regulations, according to SFC W. Kuzemchok NCO in charge of the Lancaster Army Recruiting Station, now permits enlistment of musicians directly into the Army band career field. The revised AR also provides that after the Army bandsman enlists and finishes basic combat training he will become eligible to attend the bandsman course of study.

Prior to being accepted for the Army band career field, the applicant must pass a mental and physical examination at New Cumberland General Depot. If accepted, then he will be auditioned at Fort Meade, Maryland, by the bandmaster.

If the bandmaster feels that the applicant has met the technical proficiency requirements for the instrument, he will receive a letter containing the audition score and a recommendation that he be enlisted in the regular Army as a Bandsman.

Upon enlistment for this training, Sgt. Kuzemchok stated, he will travel at government expense, to the Army element, U. S. Naval school of music at Washington, D. C.

There he will study in a cultural atmosphere similar to that of our civilian conservatories. The range of subjects that he will study encompasses dance orchestra fundamentals, Theory, Harmony, Ear Training, Symphonic Literature, and Concert Band techniques.

If the applicant fails to pass the audition, he is not obligated in any way. However, he may choose to enlist in the regular Army through another program.
