**BIDS OPENED**

The Joy Construction Company, Landisville, was awarded a bid for a maintenance contract for the system. The bid included unit prices for work, supplies and use of equipment. The contract calls for the completion of any jobs that arise after the contractors have completed their jobs. Some of the unit prices included \$1.74 per hour for unskilled labor; \$2.85 for skilled labor; \$3.75 for use of the dump truck; \$1.50 for use of the pick-up truck; \$8.50 for use of the loader, backhoe and other similar equipment; \$6.00 for use of another loader; \$6.00 for air compressor; \$2.00 for pump and \$10.00 for use of power saw used for cutting cast iron pipes.
