He died of injuries suffered March 5, when he fell down the basement steps at his home, 144 Cooper Ave., Landisville. Dr. Charles P. Stahr, deputy coroner, said death resulted from a fractured skull.

Born in East Hempfield Twp., a son of the late Phares W. and Elizabeth Swarr Baker, he was a member of the Landisville Church of God. He was a director of the Church of God Old Folks Home at Carlisle.

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Gilchrist Tells Rotarians Of Murphy Stores

Robert Gilchrist, manager of the Mount Joy G. C. Murphy Store, was guest speaker Tuesday noon at the weekly luncheon meeting of the local Rotary Club.

Giving what in Rotary is called a "classification" talk, he told his fellow clubmen some of the interesting features of his particular business and in particular of the Murphy Store chain.

The local store is one of more than 300 in 14 states. The total sales for the chain were 214 million dollars last year and is the fourth largest variety outlet in the country. Starting with one store at McKeesport, Pa., the local manager's hometown—the chain grew from one unit in 1906 to 12 in 1911.

Gilchrist detailed the steps through which a young man progresses as he works his way up in the Murphy chain, mentioned the qualifications which are needed and listed some of the benefits which a career man in the organization will enjoy.

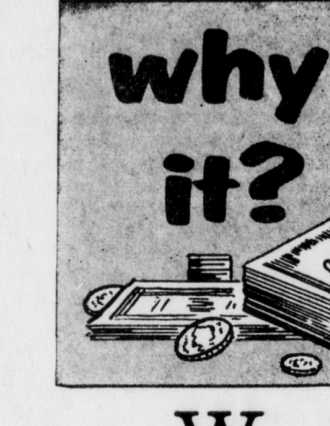

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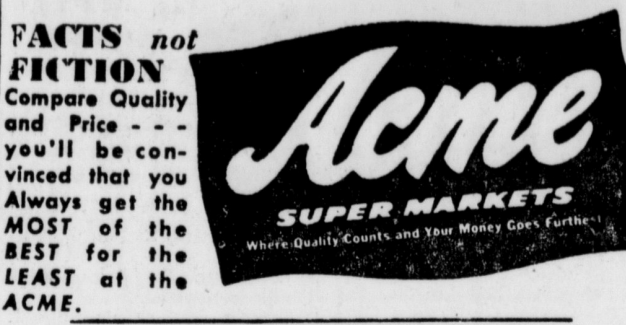
