## F&M Band To Appear Tuesday

Franklin and Marshall College band will make a personal appearance in Mt. Joy next Tuesday, April 9. The musical evening is being sponsored by the local B. P. W. club and will be held in the local elementary school auditorium, at 7:45 p. m.

The concert band of fifty members was organized in 1936 and has played as many as forty concerts during a school year. John H. Peifer, Jr. is the band director. His musical background includes being a member and past president of the Pennsylvania Bandmasters Association; member and past president of the Pennsylvania College Bandmasters Association; member and former chairman of the eastern division of the National Association of Music Educators; member of the National Association of Music Educators; member of the Pennsylvania Music Educators Association; one of the originators and former business manager and treasurer of the Lancaster Symphony orchestra; former president of the Lancaster Local of the Musicians Union; originator of and director of the Red Rose City Band which provides free concerts twice a week at Buchanan and Musser Parks; in cooperation with the Lancaster Recreation Association originated youth dances in the city parks, which were attended by over 10,000 youths; director of Bands at Franklin and Marshall College since 1936; founder and advisor to the Honorary Band Fraternity Mu Upsilon Sigma. He has seen the fraternity grow to the point where they have now applied for a Copyright for the Ritual and the second Chapter at Lafayette College. He was the first Honorary Life Member of the Fraternity.

Mr. Peifer will direct the Tuesday performance which will feature Jack Tyler, Geo. Caragnaro, John Buchanan, Albert Werner, and Donald Roeder as instrumental soloists. Tickets are being sold by the members of the local B. P. W. group which are fifty cents for adults and twenty-five cents for children. The members of the Mount Joy Elementary School Band will be guests of the club at the concert.

## Plan Tests For New Students

Pre-school tests will be administered in the Manheim Central Elementary Schools. Two days have been set aside for the Elementary buildings with the time and dates listed below.

Children who currently are attending kindergarten classes in the district have been given the Pre-school test and will not report for classes during this enrollment period.

Parents have been notified by letter, regarding the time and the school for this enrollment. Parents who have not received letters, are asked to take their children to the school in their vicinity during the afternoon of the days scheduled.

This year, only the Maturity Test will be given. Every effort has been made to minimize the time involved in waiting and in the testing process. Smaller groups have been arranged to insure more attention to each child. These results will help determine the child's readiness for school and will be of great assistance in helping parents to prepare the child for the coming term.

## Homes For Aged Alerted On Fire Safety Measures

Harrisburg, Mar. — The president of the Pennsylvania Welfare Department is waging an all out war to present fires in institutions housing elderly and handicapped people so that Pennsylvania will not be faced with similar tragedies to those which occurred in Council Bluffs, Iowa and Warrenton, Missouri.

Elias Cohen, Director of the Bureau of Services for the Aging of the Welfare Department, said, "The Secretary has given us the green light to put as much teeth in this preventive effort as we need to make it effective."

This means that if necessary the names of all known violators will be sent to the Department of Labor and Industry for possible use of the Panic Act, under which the fire safety measures are enforced. It also means that after a thorough investigation is made of homes which fail to cooperate, the license of such homes may be revoked," Mr. Cohen explained.

In plain words these measures could mean criminal prosecution and loss of income to persistent violators," Cohen pointed out. Deputy Secretary Lourie said, "These may appear to be tough measures but we feel it is far better for all concerned to be tough now so we won't be sorry later."

The letters also requested the fire chiefs to instruct the administrators of the homes and institutions how to conduct fire drills and how to use fire fighting equipment.

At the same time requests have been sent out to officials of every institution housing elderly and handicapped persons asking them to take every safety measure necessary to prevent the starting of fires.
