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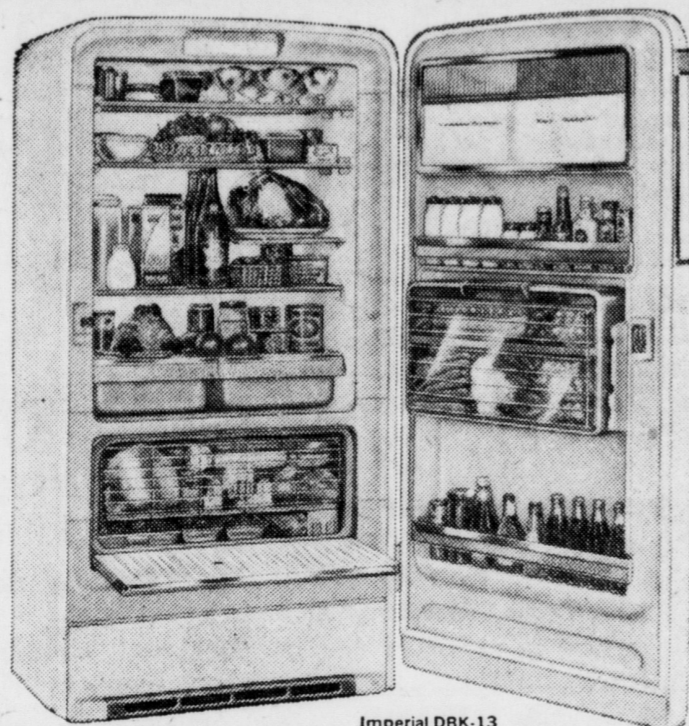

In sharp contrast with the senior class, only 28 percent of the 9th, 10th, and 11th grade students have a desire to attend college. Mr. Barber explains that many students do not really intend on going on to a college until they reach their senior year, at which time they realize the value of higher education.

In the survey recently taken at the school, it was found that college-bound students were interested in no less than 27 different institutions of higher learning.
